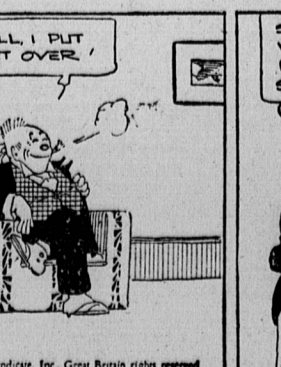
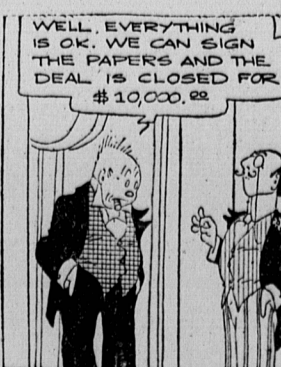

### INDEX NUMBERS OF TWENTY MINING STOCKS

The weighted index number of twenty mining stocks computed by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics on the base 1916 equals 100, was 59.8 for the week ending November 17, as compared with 58.8 for the previous week.

Eleven gold stocks rose from 55.7 to 56.4, four gold-copper stocks from 74.9 to 77.3, and five silver and miscellaneous stocks fell from 23.9 to 23.5.

Among the gold stocks weekly average prices behaved as follows:—Coniarum mounted from 25c to 26c, Hollinger \$5.14 to \$5.34, Lake Shore from \$20.43 to \$20.75, McIntyre from \$19.69 to \$19.73, Premier from 56c to 61c, Sylvanite from 67c to 70c and Wright-Hargreaves from \$2.85 to \$2.88. Dome declined from \$12.94 to \$12.82 and Kirkland Lake from 28c to 26c.

Average weekly prices were higher for all of the gold-copper stocks. Amulet rose from 17c to 19c, Hudson Bay from \$3.92 to \$4.15, Noranda \$19.97 to \$20.47 and Sherritt-Gordon from 43c to 45c.

In the silver and miscellaneous group Mining Corporation dropped from \$1.29 to \$1.24 while Nipissing mounted from \$1.12 to \$1.14.

### REGISTER OF LANDING GROUND IN BRITAIN

(Canadian Press)

LONDON, Nov. 26—An ever-growing worth imitation wherever amateur pilots fly is that of the Automobile Association, which has just issued a complete register of landing grounds in Great Britain. The field registered are not necessarily licensed by the Air Ministry, but all have been safely used by aircraft. Brief but sufficient details are given of every landing ground and of the country immediately surrounding it. A tiny district map is accompanied by a plan on a slightly larger scale of the field itself. The charges imposed for landing, if any, are listed, together with the addresses of the nearest hotels, the nearest fully equipped aerodrome, local fuel suppliers, telephone nearby, railway stations, transport facilities and so forth. The surface is clearly described and special warnings are included where necessary.
