Regulations Re Migratory Birds

The National Parks Bureau of the Department of Mines and Resources, Ottawa, has just issued the Regulations regarding migratory birds for the current year.

Open Seasons (Both dates inclusive)

Ducks (other than Eiders, Geese (other than Brant) September 20 to November 15.
Eider Ducks—September 20 to November 15.
Wilson's or Jack-Snipe—October 1 to November 15.
Woodcock—October 1 to October 31.

Closed Seasons

There is a closed season throughout the year on brant, wood ducks, swans, cranes, curlew, willets, godwits, upland plover, black-bellied and golden plover, greater and lesser yellow-legs, Avocets, Dowitchers, knots, oyster-catchers, phalaropes, stilts, surf-birds, turnstones, and all shore birds, except Wilson's snipe and woodcock.

The possession of migratory game birds killed during the open season is allowed in Prince Edward Island until January 31 following open season.

Bag Limits

Ducks (exclusive of Mergansers) 12 in any day; Geese (other than Brant), 5 in any day; Wilson's or Jack snipe, 15 in any day; Woodcock, 3 in any day; eight, not more than 150 ducks exclusive of Mergansers, 50 geese, (other than Brant) 100 Woodcock and 200 Wilson's Snipe in one season.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16—(AP)—

Sgt. Joe Louis will start an exhibition

trek Wednesday that will eventually

carry him overseas for a display of the

heavyweight boxing crown.

The War Department, the brown-

bomber's duration manager, dis-

close today that the champ will

tour army camps in the United

States for 100 days and then go

abroad for workouts before con-

ducting his exhibition trek.

Following a preliminary exhibition

tonight at Fort George G. Meade,

Maryland, Louis will begin the

tour in the 1st Service Com-

mand with headquarters at Bos-

ton.

Exhibitions in the various camps

of the commands will be coupled

with talks by Louis to the soldiers

about physical fitness.
