GOV-GENERALS ARRIVAL WILL BE BROADCAST

MONCTON, N. B., Mar. 19.—The arrival of the New Governor General, the Earl of Bessborough and his welcome to the Dominion, will be broadcast direct from the pier at Halifax to all corners of Canada, according to arrangements which have been made by E. A. Weir, Director of Radio for the Canadian National System. The Vice Regal Party will arrive in port at 10 a. m. April 4 and will be met by the Prime Minister and the Secretary of State. They will come ashore at 11 o'clock and there will be a reception of about half an hour's duration on the pier, when the inspection of the Guard of Honor and other formalities will be broadcast. The swearing-in ceremony will be broadcast from the Legislative Building at noon. The whole historical event will be carried into all the provinces by a network of Canadian National telegraphs, with Canadian National and associated stations linked up from sea to sea.

Those of the lounge room are of Canadian oriental design. The work is under the direction of Mr. A. H. Mould, manager of the hotel. The appointment of Mr. A. A. Pomeroy, a prominent citizen of Charlottetown as assistant manager is a very popular one. Both he and Mr. Mould are men of long experience in the hotel business. Mr. Fry, the accountant, and Miss Margaret Irving, stenographer, are other members of the office staff. The hotel will be opened some time between Easter Monday and April 15.

LORD IRWIN GIVEN VOTE OF CONFIDENCE

Members of the Chamber of Princes At New Delhi, India Voice Their Approval of Viceroy.

NEW DELHI, India, March 19.—Members of the Chamber of Princes expressed today by an acclamatory vote their devotion to the Throne their appreciation of the attitude of the British Government and an enthusiastic tribute to Viceroy Irwin. The resolution was moved by the Maharajah Patiala.

Lord Irwin, deeply touched, said he never had lost faith in eventual solution of India's problem. Although recent months had been anxious, he assured the Princes the Government of India would assist them to the utmost.

MAY LOSE THE SUPPORT OF THE LIBERALS

Duration of Labor Govt. Depends On Solution of Crisis In Liberal Ranks.

LONDON, March 1.—Duration of the Labor Government depended today, critics believed, upon solution of the crisis in the Liberal Party which probably will reach its head at a meeting of the Liberals next Tuesday. Unless Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George, nominal leader, can secure the loyalty of the bulk of his followers and rely upon their cooperation in divisions, he obviously cannot guarantee that support to the Government, which it must have if it is to live.

It is understood that he is using the interval until next Tuesday, when he will present to the Liberal Party a series of resolutions outlining their relation to the Government, in attempting to reach an agreement with the Government which will be endorsed by his own followers.

Town May Be Laid Waste

LAPAZ, Bolivia, March 19.—Complete abandonment of the Santa Barbara section may be necessary shortly as a consequence of a gradual sliding of the ground on which the district rests toward the Rio Choqueyapu. More than 40 houses have been totally destroyed by the creeping of their foundations, and hardly a house in the area does not each morning now show some new effects of the earth movements.

Engineers and geologists are disagreed as to the causes of the landslide, but both assert the waters of the Rio Choqueyapu have filtered into subterranean cavities and undermined the area.

Good News From Horse Island

Survivors Of Viking Disaster Numbering 121 At Last Have Sufficient Food And Comfortable Lodgings—26 Missing

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Mar. 19.—Good news came down from Horse Island today after existing three days on the slender rations of the few families there, survivors of the Viking disaster to the number of 121 at last have sufficient food, comparatively comfortable lodgings, and medical care. Six others, who escaped death from the explosion that split open the sealing steamer off Horse Island

last Sunday night, were previously rescued. Sorrow, however, continued in absence of any word concerning the fate met by twenty-six persons still unreported. Latest official figures issued by the Government gave the Viking's complement as 155, survivors 127 and missing 28. Two bodies have been recovered, and to agree with the total of 155, the missing.

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Italian Fliers Are Killed

FISA, Italy, March 19.—Colonel Umberto Maddalena, famous Italian flier and finder of the dirigible Italia survivors; Lieutenant Fausto Ceccoli and Mechanic-Sergeant Damonte were killed today when their seaplane fell into the sea.

Their plane was flying at a height of 1,500 feet and about 900 feet offshore today, when observers saw it dive suddenly and streak toward the surface of the water.

HUNGARIAN CHARGED WITH SABOTAGE

Plotted To Destroy Giant Dirigible "Akron", Now Under Construction For U. S. Navy.

AKRON, Ohio, March 19.—Paul F. Kassey, former officer in the Hungarian navy, was charged in a criminal syndicalism affidavit late today with a plot to destroy the giant dirigible "Akron," now under construction for the United States navy.

The affidavit charging sabotage was sworn out by assistant county prosecutor George Hargreaves, who said federal secret service men working with Kassey on a construction crew, discovered the former Hungarian officer was leaving rivets out of the frame work and doing other things that would jeopardize the safety of the giant craft.

Hargreaves said that the agents learned that the sabotage worker had planned to get to the control car of the ship and arrange the apparatus so that disaster would result the first time the "Akron" took the air. The affidavit alleges that on March 10, "by-spoken words and word of mouth," Kassey made it known to fellow workers that he was planning to destroy the airship.

SECOND DAY OF ISOLATION

Most Railway Lines Cleared Yesterday—Ferry Held By Ice Blockade.

The Province experienced a second day of isolation from the mainland yesterday, as the car ferry which left Tormentine at 11.45 a. m. became firmly wedged in the drift ice after she had progressed about a mile and a half toward Borden, and the mall plane was unable to make its usual flight due to unfavorable flying conditions. The ferry was carried by the tide in the drift ice to a point about five miles east of Tormentine, and nine miles from Borden in which position she still remained at a late hour last night. It is understood that the Amherst hockey team is on the steamer.

The Murray Harbor Railway line is now opened as far as Fodhla where the train was stalled since yesterday morning. All other lines are cleared except a section between Alberton and Tignish. The eastern train from Georgetown arrived in Mount Stewart at 3.15 p. m. while the train from Souris arrived in Charlottetown at 8.15 p. m. The train which was yesterday morning at Kelvin proceeded westward to Summerside and continued toward Tignish. Seventy-five guests are registered at the Abbeville Hotel, Borden, where they are awaiting the car ferry. They are mainly commercial travellers who are leaving the Province, Mr. Cerretti, the hotel manager reports. Mr. J. D. Stewart, K. C., and Mr. W. E. Bentley, K. C., who are detained at Borden enroute to Montreal, are returning to the city today; it is understood the weather bound guests take advantage of the bowling alleys and the pool room for amusement. They have plenty of food and nothing to worry about.

Will Aid Viking Survivors If Necessary

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 19.—The State Department announced today the coastguard cutter, General Green had been ordered to proceed direct to St. John's, Newfoundland, and to go from there if necessary to aid survivors of the sealing vessel Viking at Horse Island. The General Green will be under the direction of Consul-General Edward A. Dow, at St. John's, who cabled a request for aid earlier today.

The cutter is a small vessel, 125 feet long, and a larger cutter, now at Boston, has been ordered to be ready to sail for Newfoundland if its assistance is required. The General Green sailed from Boston yesterday to make advance preparations for the international ice patrol, and received its new orders by radiograph.

1,800 Prisoners Riot In Illinois State Prison

Convicts Apply Torches To Half Dozen Buildings—Three Shot During Frenzied Riot—Nearly Half Million Dollars Damage—No Escapes.

10 Percent Cut In Salaries Of Civil Servants

WELLINGTON, N. Z., March 19.—After an all night sitting the House of Representatives today gave first reading to the New Zealand Government's finance bill, providing for a reduction of 10 percent in the salaries of civil servants. The Labor members strongly opposed the measure. The Government also plans to cut the salaries of Cabinet Ministers and members of Parliament by 10 percent from April 1 and the Governor General has voluntarily consented to a similar reduction.
