BOSTON, April 10.—Pending the disposition of a petition for a writ of habeas corpus by Werner Van Horn, under indictment for illegal interstate transportation of explosive, with which he attempted to destroy the international railway bridge at Vanceboro, Maine, Federal Judge Morton today granted a motion of counsel for the defence for a continuance of proceedings to the indictment.

The Government announced its intention of filing a demurrer to the habeas corpus petition.
