**THE "PRINCE EDWARD."**—The Car Ferry steamer did not reach Charlottetown Saturday until 12 o'clock midnight. The hauling of a good deal of cargo and having to take on coal at the Picton Landing Piers caused the delay. Much dissatisfaction is felt over the new arrangement whereby the steamer takes on coal at the pier from hoppers. It is claimed the steamer is not equipped for coaling in that way and the result is that there is not only great delay to freight handling and inconvenience to passengers, but much of the coal dust gets blown all through the steamer.

# IN MEMORIAM

EDWARD P. SHAW.

A telegram received in the City Saturday announced the death in Roxbury, Mass., under peculiarly sad circumstances, of Mr. Edward P. Shaw, reference to whose illness was made in Saturday morning's Guardian. Mr. and Mrs. Shaw, formerly Miss Jessie Gillespie, daughter of Mr. W. G. Gillespie of this City, and their little son were on their way to Prince Edward Island where they purposed spending the summer. Leaving their home in South Bend, Indiana they stopped off at Boston a little over a week ago for a short visit to friends there before proceeding to the Island. Shortly after the arrival there Mr. Shaw became seriously ill. He was taken to the Deaconess Hospital where, notwithstanding the best medical skill and the loving care of his devoted wife he passed away on Saturday. The deceased was a son of the late Edward P. Shaw of West Medford, and formerly of Brackley Point, this province. He was a graduate M. A. of Harvard University and for a number of years past conducted a large

wholesale grocery business in South Bend, Indiana. Two brothers, Harry and Norwood and one sister, Mrs. Boston all of West Medford, survive. His young widow upon whom this crushing blow has fallen so suddenly, after less than two years of happy wedded life, and her baby son will have the heartfelt sympathy of a host of friends in Charlottetown who had looked forward with pleasure to her visit home.
