A DUET OF ERRORS

It is difficult to decide who made the worse error in Today's deal—South in bidding, or East in the defensive play.

North dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

♠ A 5
♥ 6 4 3
♦ Q J 10 7 4
♣ K 7 2

The bidding:

North	East	South	West
Pass	Pass	4♠	5♠
Dble.	Pass	4♠	5♠

It is obvious enough that South was guilty of "taking charge" when he ignored his partner's double of five diamonds and went blithely ahead to five spades. South's opening bid had described his holding adequately, and if North chose to double the opponents, he certainly should have been given the last word on the subject! As may be seen at a glance, West would have been in serious trouble at five diamonds, doubled, because of the worthless dummy he would have picked up and, further, because of the horrible break of his own suit.

South did not deserve good luck in this deal, considering his bidding, because West could scarcely foresee its outcome, and in any case, the lead would not have been fatal except for East's "brainstorm." South ruffed the diamond king, cashed the spade king and then led to the spade ace. He led the diamond queen from dummy, and East discarded a club! South did likewise, and West took the trick with the ace. Now, successful defense was impossible, since two good diamonds were in dummy.

East most certainly should have ruffed the diamond queen, and not allowed his partner's ace to be driven out. West, for his part, might have refused to take the ace, and perhaps East would have caught on and ruffed the diamond jack if declarer led it next.
