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King's Horses Won \$66,156 During 1946

LONDON, Nov. 18 (AP)—All the King's horses won His Majesty \$66,156 during the 1946 racing season but it was good enough for seventh place in the list of leading money winners in Britain's first full calendar of sport of kings since 1938.

French horses took Britain for a ride. Marcel Bouscass sent the best of his thoroughbreds across the channel to win \$21,317 with 12 winners, most of them in long distance races.

This made Bouscass the second highest winner of the Chain of Grass tracks that put horse racing within the reach of nearly every Englishman. Lincoln, Aintree, Chester, Goodwood, Newmarket and Doncaster all had record crowds.

For the 19th time in his long career in the saddle, Gordon Richards captured the jockey championship, adding 212 winners this season to his total of 3,000 racked by the end of 1945.

Frank Butters trained 60 winners worth \$56,170, making him the leading trainer for the seventh time since 1927.

The grand old stallion, Hyperion, again was the leading sire, 58 of his offspring winning a total of \$5,960 in first place money.

Cliff Roach Heads Big Five Scoring Race

HALIFAX, Nov. 18 (CP)—Cliff Roach, playing coach of Truro Bears, picked up one goal and five assists in Saturday's game against Halifax United Services to vault into first place in the Maritime Big Five scoring list with a 17-point total, figures compiled by the Canadian Press showed today.

Tied in second place with 14 points each are Sammy McManus of Moncton Hawks and Lou Medynski of Truro, who scored two goals and got one assist in the week-end match. McManus has 10 goals, six more than Roach, and Medynski nine.

Jimmy MacIntyre is all alone in third place with 13 points, made up of eight goals and five assists. Truro's Kink McDonald and Moncton's Trainer are tied in fourth with 10 apiece while seven players share the next spot.

In the ninth, with Zent still reeling, the Spider cut loose with a long series of straight rights and lefts to the head. He whaled away for 45 seconds without a respite, until the Mexican toppled over backwards, remaining down long after referee Tommy Rawson reached his 10-count.
