ICE CONDITIONS BETTER - Ice conditions improved somewhat in Northumberland Strait yesterday and the ferry had better time on the nine-mile run between Borden and Tormentine. Canadian National Railways officials said last night, however, that despite the better time the ferry had "nothing going" on all crossings yesterday. The train with passengers and mails from the mainland was more than an hour and a half behind schedule last night. Monday night the train was more than two hours late, principally because of delay in the crossing of the ferry.

COLDER WEATHER - The weather man has kept Prince Edward Islanders shivering since the brief thaw Sunday. Early yesterday morning the temperature dropped five above zero, accompanied by a 30-mile-per-hour wind. The night previous the wind reached a velocity of 40-miles-per-hour. Warren Burns, weather observer at the Charlottetown Experimental Station said, Average wind velocity since the thaw Sunday was 34 miles per hour. Mr. Burns said, an unusually high average for forty hours. Last night the wind howled down somewhat. City streets and sidewalks were sheets of ice since the thaw and numerous minor traffic accidents occurred.

Stirring Address By Dr. Johnston Of St. Dunstan's

In an address to the Catholic Women's League on Monday night, Dr. Herbert Johnston, Ph. D., Professor of English at St. Dunstan's University said that it is the duty of the Government in its capacity as Christian to be indifferent to the moral issues involved. There is the possibility of confusion because of the attitude of certain American speakers and periodicals. These are putting mistaken ideas of Americanism before their Christian people. Even a citizen of a neutral country if a Christian cannot be indifferent in sentiment to the war. Indifferentism in spiritual matters we must not have any people but we must have evil in all its manifestations.

Rev. Dr. O'Hanley Gives Address At K. of C. Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Knights of Columbus was held in their hall on Queen Street last evening with fair attendance. Reports of the various Committees were read and discussed. German Philosophy

"There are many reasons for the attitude of the present German people. But the long-run explanation lies in the philosophy and literature. Hegel - philosophical father of Marxist communism is also in many present-day developments in Germany. Attempts to reconcile contradictory philosophical attitudes of the day, Hegel, artfully lead to a conclusion that what they reach is the absolute and to be exclusively true. Each one is true, Hegel allowed, but is not the whole and the whole is not what reaches its completeness through the process of its own development. Nature is the external manifestation of an absolute and eternal idea which it expresses in the world of reality. Nature is constantly working its way back to the unity and simplicity of the absolute. So each contradiction in reality of the world of nature provides an opportunity for the synthesis of those opposites in a unity which is nearer the world of nature one step nearer the absolute. Contradiction and opposition, then, are at the very heart of reality. It is the meaning. The truth is the whole, but the progressive realization of the whole entails a progressive overcoming of the partial. The realization of the whole from which its unity will come. Each particular attitude is the negation of every other one, and the other is still incomplete, never resulting from their synthesis. This is the progressive realization of the idea, the march of the Hegelian God through the world, creates a path of devastation strewn with ruins."

Philosophers' Conflict

"So long as this process applies only to ideas, comparatively harmless, but since the world of nature includes the whole of reality, it applies also to things. The conflict between the partial and the whole becomes a conflict between philosophy and reality. Opposition between ideas is contradiction; opposition between the partial and the whole is not an accident; it is the law of being. The actualization of the Absolute involves the total submission of individuals to the State in mind as well as body, a higher unity and a step nearer the total unity of the Absolute. And the State itself, another although higher and more unified individual, must necessarily conflict with other States. This is the logical and fully developed outcome of a philosophical system. The particular thing, taken by itself, asserts itself only by destroying another thing. These are literally the words of Hegel. The German high schools for about a century, they contributed in large part to the last Great War and to the present one."

Result In Germany

"Results of that philosophy in practice - false view of nature of man, enslavement of man to state, unending expansion of state in wars of conquest, ruthless suppression of any opposing forces. Results in present-day Germany - attacks on Christian churches and attempted substitution of old tribal gods found in Germanic and Scandinavian folk-lore, secret police, blood purges, persecution of minorities, denial of human rights to citizens. This view and organization of society attempts to impose itself on the whole world. We are fighting for the preservation of the remnants of Christian civilization and
