PPC. EARL J. GALLANT of Lawrence, Mass. has been awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action with a medical detachment in an infantry regiment of the United States in the Philippines. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Columbus Arsenault, Russell Street, Summerside. He was born in Summerside and moved to the U.S.A. when he was six months old. The 22-year-old infantryman has spent 19 months overseas in England, France and Germany. He is married and his wife resides at 528 Haverhill Street, Lawrence. He is the son of Mr. Philomena Gallant and has a brother, Wilfred J. Gallant in service with the navy at Pearl Harbor. The citation which has been forwarded to his wife reads as follows: "The Silver Star was awarded to Private Earl J. Gallant for gallantry in action against an armed enemy of the United States in Germany on March 29. Under a hail of mortar, machine gun and sniper fire PPC. Gallant valiantly scaled a 75-foot cliff and crossed 100 yards of open terrain to reach a seriously wounded comrade. He was not only successful in fall Private Gallant and a companion administered first aid and carried the wounded man to safety, making his immediate evacuation possible. Private Gallant's valiant action and unselfish deeds have undoubtedly saved the wounded soldier's life and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. -S

"TILL WE MEET AGAIN" ONE OF YEAR'S TOP PICTURES

Paramount's "Till We Meet Again," starring Ray Milland and Barbara Britton, received wide acclaim from the audience at the showing last night at the Capitol Theatre.

Death Yesterday Of Mr. James H. Prichard, S'side

The death occurred early yesterday morning at his home in Summerside of James H. Prichard. He had been in failing health for two years and had been confined to bed since the first of this year.

Mr. Prichard had a very interesting and unusual life, having travelled in most of the countries of four continents. He was born in Wales seventy years ago and as a boy emigrated to South America.

He lived for a while in Chile and after visiting some of the other South American countries he made his way up through the United States to Canada. He set up a bookkeeping business for a short while and about forty years ago came to Prince Edward Island.

For many years he was employed as a bookkeeper with the Hall Manufacturing Co. Ltd., Summerside, and later he worked for the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders' Association. For this organization he travelled through England, Norway, Sweden and Germany.

In 1929 at the request of the Russian Government he went to that country and spent more than a year there, assisting in the organization of the fur industry. Since his return from Russia he has been semi-retired, occupying himself with his large vegetable garden and his fox ranch.

He was secretary-treasurer of the Board of Trustees of the Prince County Hospital. An ardent and enthusiastic fisherman, he was the formation of the Summerside Fishing Club. He was also a keen hunter and fisherman.

The late Mr. Prichard is survived by his wife, the former Mary Prichard, nee MacDonald, of Summerside, also two sons, Sgt. Norman, R.C.A.F. stationed at No. 1 R. & N.S., Summerside and Sgt. Robert, in Montreal; and one daughter, Mrs. W. A. Watson, Summerside.

There are also four brothers, Samuel and William, Western Canada, Barbara, a graduate of the University of Toronto, Campbellton, N.B.; and one sister, Margaret, in New Hampshire.

The funeral will be held at 10 o'clock on Friday with service at St. Mary's Anglican Church. Previous to that there will be a private burial in the People's Cemetery. -S

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New Landings In Philippines

By FRED HAMPSON MANILA, June 6 - (Thursday) - United States troops, sealing off Davao Gulf, one-time Japanese stronghold in the Philippines, landed with warship and air support Tuesday at Cape San Augustin, southeasternmost tip of Mindanao, and on Balut Island, west of Davao Gulf. Opposition was termed negligible.

American conquest of Okinawa raced towards completion after 67 days of the most costly fighting of any Pacific Island invasion to date.

For the first time since troops stormed ashore on April 1, Admiral Chester Nimitz' communiqué yesterday omitted mention of ground action on Okinawa, but it was at his headquarters that a special announcement was planned as soon as reports became available from Lt.-Gen. Simon B. Buckner, Jr. commanding the ground forces.

Latest accounts had placed the Japanese homeland some 325 miles to the northeast.

Essex North Still In Doubt

WINDSOR, Ont., June 6 - (CP) - More than a dozen polling divisions in Essex North have not reported to returning officers, leaving the final riding vote in doubt. Reason for the delay is not known.

Alex Parent, Liberal-Labor, was leading by more than 800 votes with 19 polls to be heard from in an unofficial tabulation late Monday night, but his nearest opponent, Progressive-Conservative Harry Drouillard, has refused to concede the riding pending inclusion of the missing polls and soldier and advance votes.

NEW YORK, June 6 - (CP) - British tanks carrying and laying their own bridges played an important part in the invasion of France and Germany and in the British advance in Burma, the British Information Services reported tonight, quoting the War Office.

The bridge-spans are so mounted that when tanks are held up by deep ditches or cratered roads, the bridging tanks can immediately lay across the obstacle a bridge which all other tanks and vehicles can cross without a single man having to leave the bridge tank or be exposed to enemy fire.
