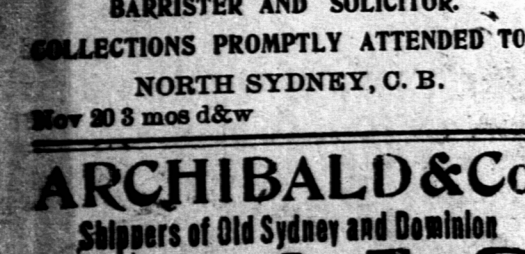

OCTOBER 13. JOSEPH IN PRISON. Gen. 39. 20-40. 15. Memory verses, 21-22. GOLDEN TEXT.

But the Lord was with Joseph, and showed him mercy—Gen. 39. 21. OUTLINE.

- 1. The Mercy of God, v. 20-23.
- 2. The Wisdom of God, v. 1-8.

### LESSON HELPS.

Joseph had not been eleven years a slave in Egypt. He lived at Heliopolis, which was twenty miles north of Memphis, and was the most ancient capital of lower Egypt. The condition of the slaves seemed to be largely dependent upon the caprice of the masters.

Egypt was highly civilized, with its well-tilled fields, its temples, schools, and standing army. In Egypt the second period in the life of Joseph began. As a slave he gained the confidence of his master, until the false accusation of a wicked woman he was cast into prison, where he remained for a period of two years.

"But the Lord was with Joseph"—As he had been with him in the house of Potiphar so was he with him in the prison. "Gave him favor"—The Lord enabled Joseph so to speak and live as to win the hearts of others.

"The prison"—Was probably a small building with an arched roof such as is now seen in the East. Little attention was paid to cleanliness and ventilation.

23, "Committed to Joseph's hand"—Joseph became an underkeeper of the prison. The jailer saw that he was honest and intelligent, and so he trusted him. "He was the does of it"—That is, it was done under his order on by his authority. "The Lord made it to prosper"—Because Joseph was both wise and good.

13 "After these things"—Mentioned in chapter 39. "The butler"—means the cup-bearer, whose duty it was to present wine at the table to the king. He was an officer of high rank and of influence, as he could reach the ear of the king.

"His baker"—Rather, his cook, whose duty it was to provide for the royal table. "Had offended their lord"—In what way we know not, but probably by conspiring against life. "Put them in ward"—That is, in custody. "The house of the captain" here were his headquarters.

4. "Charged Joseph with them"—This is a proof of his confidence. He served them by supplying their wants. "A season in ward"—How long a time is meant by a season we do not know.

5, 6. They dreamed a dream"—Dreams were regarded as of supernatural origin, and it is not to be wondered at that prior to the Gospel, God should speak through dreams. "Each man according to the interpretation of his dreams"—The imagery of the dream of each one was in (1) the line of his particular pursuit, and (2) was exactly fitted to indicate his future state.

The dream of each one answered to the event. "Behold, they were sad"—Observe (1) that the sorrow of the soul is reflected from the face, and (2) it was not the prison made them sad, but the dream, for God has more ways than one to sadden. When the prison failed the dream did not. When men knew the worst they are often brave to meet it, but it is the uncertainty which perplexes.

7. "Wherefore look ye so sadly to-day"—Joseph was sympathetic (1) by nature, and (2) because he too was a prisoner. If we suffer a certain way, we would be the more sympathetic with those who suffer in the same way.

8. "We have dreamed a dream, and there is no interpreter of it"—It was common to interpret dreams at that time, and these dreamers were troubled because they could not go to the wise men of Egypt to have their dreams explained. By the utterance of a single thought Joseph turns their thoughts upward. "Do not interpretations belong to God"—He meant the true God, even Jehovah whom he worshipped. It were in vain to go to the astrologers of the land. "Tell me then"—So that by the help of God, the dreams be interpreted.
