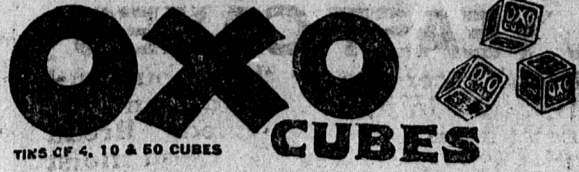

...TORONTO, Nov. 10.—Americans have a keen appreciation of the value of Victory Bonds. Subscriptions on the other side of the border up to Wednesday night totalled \$27,281,550, two millions more than collected last year in the entire campaign. "Our work across the border, does not assume a character of a drive, it is a collection, not a canvass," said Mr. J. H. Gundy, chairman of the Dominion Special Subscriptions Committee, which has this collection in charge. "Our American campaign is now half way to its objective and has already exceeded the results of last year. "No doubt a tremendous amount of money for this loan could be raised by bold, persistent efforts in the United States. JOURNAL OF THE CANADIAN BANKERS' ASSOCIATION FOR OCTOBER

The current issue of the Journal of the Canadian Bankers' Association is particularly helpful in aiding its readers toward a clear understanding of the economic problems with which peace has left the world in general, and Canada in particular, face to face. Where is the new wealth to come from that is demanded to better social conditions and finance reconstruction? In a general survey of the economic situation in Great Britain, which appeared originally in Round Table, this question is discussed with unusual accuracy and lucidity. It is contended that increase of wealth is even more important than its better distribution, imperative though that may be, and ample evidence is presented to justify this view. The writer points out how little way the large surplus incomes of Great Britain would go in raising the general level of income, and to what an extent these surplus incomes are already absorbed in the essential task of providing the country with fresh capital. The need for drastic curtailment of public extravagance and private luxury is driven home with much force. In this

same connection, particular interest attaches to an article by the Dominion Statistician, Dr. R. H. Coats, reviewing recent estimates of the wealth of various nations, and making a detailed estimate of Canada's national wealth.

What have been the causes of the tremendous world-wide increase in prices, and what is the outlook as to the future price level? Hon. A. C. Miller, of the United States Federal Reserve Board, ascribes the rise of prices mainly to the increase in the world's currency involved by reckless or desperate methods of war finance. Wherever two pieces of money are running after one loaf of bread, or one yard of cloth, where before there was but one piece, goods will get dear and money get cheap. It is the artificial abundance of money of one kind or another that is mainly responsible for the elevation of prices which has been universally experienced in the past five years. This being the case and the process of deflation necessarily being slow, it is likely, in Mr. Miller's view, that while in a long series of years prices may be expected to decline, the fall from year to year will be slight, not sufficient to disturb ordinary business calculations.

How can the world, and particularly Europe, get back to production? Mr. Miller considers assistance by the United States essential, preferably through some mechanism representing producing and financial interests as well as the Government. Mr. Herbert Hoover, in a memorandum issued through the British Ministry of Food, puts the task up to Europe itself. He reviews the part played in the present demoralization by war and its continuation in the present blockades and boycotts, by experiments in socialism and bureaucratic control, by unchecked inflation of currency, and by attempts to curtail profits and control prices. He urges that whatever help the United States should give for the next year or two should be given only to countries which will set their own houses in order, cease attacking their neighbours and piling up millions in armament, and devote themselves resolutely to the increase of production! Mr. Hartley Withers, the editor of the London Economist, reviews the scheme adopted by the British Board of Trade for extending government aid to exporters. He urges that it would have been preferable to have retained investor subsidies, saved money to companies formed for the purpose of financing foreign trade, since government assistance based on the issue of long term securities really means continuing the policy of inflation and all the disturbances due to the rise in prices. Professor W. C. Clark, in a summary of the international exchange situation which states in very clear terms the course and cause of the recent fluctuations in exchange, discusses the bearing of the exchange situation on foreign trade and various alternative methods of extending credit to foreign buyers. The subject of foreign exchange is also dealt with by Mr. G. L. Stewart Patterson, with special reference to the very interesting but little known exchange situation in the far East.

In a scholarly article which can easily be understood by the laymen, Mr. Justice Russell discusses the simplification of the law. He illustrates very forcibly the confusion and uncertainty which have been introduced into the law on any topic is made clear under the present method of judicial decisions of specific cases which happen to be brought before them. The learned judge insists that the business community would be saved a tremendous amount of uncertainty and confusion and expense if Parliament, with a line or two in the statute, would determine points which it may take the course of a generation to straighten out. The lighter side of banking is very entertainingly touched upon by P. O. D., in an article in his best manner on the Majesty of Banks. The usual departments, Editorials, March of Events, Decisions of a Canadian and British Courts, and Answers to Questions, complete a number which should prove of service in the present winter of opinion.

HOW DARKNESS IS PHOTOGRAPHED

Until quite recently cinema scenes that were supposed to happen in darkness were really taken in broad daylight, but before being thrown on to the screen the film was dipped into a large tank containing deep blue dye; that produced the required effect. But the difficult problem of night cinematography has at last been solved. In a recent production there was

presented a camp setting in which the fire cast an eerie glow over the darkness. There were also excellent silhouettes of the players. These were taken one moonless night, the middle of the camp being illuminated with a strong violet flame for just two minutes, which lighted up the surrounding country. A second example was a battle subject taken at night-time. In this there appeared such details as bombs burst-

ing flashes of light, while balls of flame were pouring forth from the discharging cannon.

The first problem was to determine the composition of ammunition which would not only be sufficiently explosive, but produce a powerful light as well. The director had to manufacture a special kind of flashlight powder, which he succeeded in doing after many experiments. On a wintry night, when it was pitch dark, the man at the switch-board had a busy time, for it was his duty to explode 3,000 bombs. These were manipulated separately on no less than 40,000 feet of electric wiring.
