MONTREAL, Nov. 4—(CP)—There were 387 cattle, 102 sheep and lambs, 1,061 hogs, and 209 calves for sale on Montreal live-stock markets today. Prices on all classes of livestock were steady. Cattle were mostly common to medium quality cows and bulls. Fair quality cows and bulls sold at \$2.25, and common butchers \$1.50 to \$1.75. Common bulls \$4.50 to \$5.75. Veal calves ranged from \$9 to \$13 mostly \$10 to \$12. Good veals \$12.50 up. Drinkers \$8.50 to \$8.50 and grassers were moving slowly at \$5 to \$7.75. Yearlings were from \$4 to \$4.75. Good ewes and wethers were \$11. Back lambs and culls were discounted \$2 per hundredweight. Sheep were \$4 to \$5.50. Hogs were \$15 for B-1 dressed and up to \$11.35 off trucks delivered. Grade A drew \$1 per hog premium with discounts on off grades. Sows were \$850 to \$950 live weight.

MONTREAL, Nov. 4—(CP)—Traders were difficult to interest in the stock exchange today. Market analysts suggested the closing Wall Street was largely responsible for the apathy. All averages except papers were shaved a little in the dull deals.

Metals perked up towards the end of the session and Consolidated Smelters and Hudson Bay Mining posted fractional tilts. Hollinger dropped back. In oils, International Petroleum was a loser.

Industrials were topped by two winners, Canada Cement and Canadian Car preferred, but Dosco, Canadian Bronze and Foundation drifted down. St. Lawrence Corporation preferred firmed near the end in newsprints.

Motrol Tramways in utilities sagged 7 1/2 after being absent from trading for some time and Shawinigan was behind a fraction. Bell Telephone pushed up a little. Wabasso was ahead in miscellaneous but behind were Distillers-Seagram, Lake of Woods, Imperial Tobacco and National Breweries.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 4—(CP)—Minor southern buying and routine operations held wheat futures firm on Winnipeg grain exchange today. Final values were 1-4-1-8 higher, December at 73 cents May 76 3-8 and July 78 1-8.

Coarse grain dealings were featured by good malster and eastern buying, believed to be in connection with actual sales of barley to malsters and for feed at eastern points.

Near the close oats were 1-4 cent higher, barley and flax a cent or more above yesterday's close and rye about 3-4 cent up.

Wheat closed unchanged to 3-8 cents lower, Dec. 1.13 7-8-3-4, May 1.19-1-8-1-4; July 1.20 3-8-1-2; corn was 1-4 to 1-2 off, Dec. 77 1-4, May 83; oats 1-4 to 3-8 lower; soybeans 1 to 1 3-4 down, while rye closed 1-8 higher and lard advanced 2 1-2 to 5 cents a hundred pounds.
