### 3 Senior Officers Of C. N. R. To Retire

MONTREAL, Dec. 16—Three senior officers of the Canadian National Railways will retire from active service at the end of the year, according to announcements issued at headquarters of the system here today.

S. J. Hungerford, chairman and president, also announced the creation of a new department of research and development bearing upon all activities of the system.

The retirements and appointments are as follows:  
W. A. Kingsland, vice-president of the Central Region, retires on pension. P. L. C. Bond, heretofore general manager, Central Region, is appointed vice-president and general manager with headquarters at Toronto.

C. G. Bowker, vice-president and general manager of the Grand Trunk Western Lines (part of the Canadian National system) retires on pension. P. D. FitzPatrick, heretofore chief engineer, is appointed general manager of the Grand Trunk Western Lines, with headquarters at Detroit.

Dr. W. J. Black, director of colonization and agriculture, retires. J. S. McCowan, heretofore assistant director of the department, is appointed director with headquarters at Montreal.

S. W. Fairweather, director of the bureau of economics, is appointed chief of research and development. Mr. Fairweather, in addition to his present duties, will initiate studies of general and local problems and conduct in conjunction and co-operation with all departments, research work bearing upon all activities of the system. He will continue to report to the president.

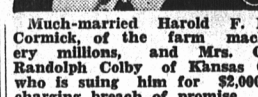
