FORD CO. DIRECTOR DIES

DETROIT, March 17 — (AP) — Frank Campsall, 62, a director of the Ford Motor Co. and for many years secretary to Henry Ford, died Saturday in a Savannah, Ga., hospital.

A native of Essex, Ont., Campsall began his career with the Ford Company March 12, 1912. He was named assistant general manager of the Company June 21, 1943, and in December of the same year was named a director.

Bank Official is Buried in Toronto

of the board of the Bank of Nova Scotia, of which he was a former president, Mr. McLeod died Tuesday at Victoria, B. C.

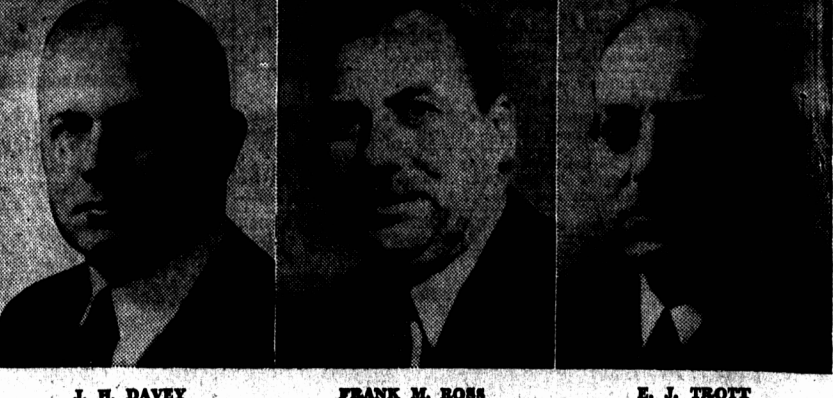

Rev. James E. Paulin, pastor of Rosedale Presbyterian Church officiated at the service. In paying tribute to Mr. McLeod's memory, he said: "There was something about his personality which arrested you. His life was a reflection of the soul within. He never could have been the man he was but for the purity of his spirit, the depth of his faith, the strength of his loyalty to God and to man. He faithfully discharged all public trusts and received high honors at the hands of his fellow men. He has left behind him a precious memory."
