The day was ideal for a pleasant outing and notwithstanding the busy season quite a number drove nine or ten miles. At the grounds a well stocked booth was furnished with delicious ice-cream, candy etc., while the tables spread in the hall nearby fairly groaned under the good things so generously furnished by the ladies. A rifle match promoted by the young men proved very popular, and was largely patronized. About sunset the crowd dispersed. The sum of forty dollars was realized which goes to the Machine Gun Fund. On behalf of the Institute, Mrs. J. E. Dingwell, President takes this opportunity of expressing thanks to the ladies other than members, who so liberally aided us in supplying cakes and well filled baskets, to the men who so efficiently prepared a place for the picnic and to all others who assisted in any way to make our effort a success.

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**CAMP SUSSEX HEARS RUMOR THAT 64TH WILL WINTER IN ST. JOHN**

SUSSEX, Sept. 14.—There are now 28 officers of the 64th in camp. The second in command, Lieut.-Col. H. Flowers, of Halifax, is here but the second major of the battalion, Major G. H. Maxwell, an artillery officer of Halifax, is at Kingston taking an infantry officer's field course. Other officers are also taking machine gun and musketry courses and this will continue until all have completed these qualifications for command, while some of the officers are recruiting in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.  
 The belief is taking firmer root here daily that the 64th will spend the winter in St. John. Little hints are now being dropped in those quarters that ought to know and from very nearly the same quarters come, too, the hope that this idea may not be carried out. Amherst would be preferred if the battalion cannot stay at Sussex. The short of the matter is that St. John has got into unpleasant odor as winter quarters for any troops. The medical officer's report on the conditions at the army when the 26th (New Brunswick) battalion was there from November to June was not satisfactory. The other places that were used for troops, the exhibition building, where the 6th Mounted Rifles, "B" Squadron, was before going to Amherst; the immigration sheds on the west side of the harbor where No. 5 Company Corps were stationed, were only fitted up in a temporary way. The Canadian Railway Construction Corps made their own provision in immigration cars.  
 Without undue criticism, too, it may be added, that the 26th, which is making a good name for itself by other measurements of military goodness than is possible in a somewhat "good-bay" town as St. John has the reputation of being did not always have the discipline that would have avoided one or two things that in themselves were small for men who are not supposed to be eleven hundred white angles but which got magnified by the townspeople. Indeed the 26th battalion has found the truth of the Shakespearean lines:—"The evil that men do lives after them; The good is oft interred with their bones."  
 There are some who think that if St. John never again has a battalion with a pay roll of \$35,000 a month in its confines it will be its own fault. But the real military objection to St. John is that there is no field on which more than two companies can extend in open order within three miles of the army and this is so far that it cannot be reached only once a day. This is on the Lancaster Heights, Belleville. The 64th however, will certainly remain for another month at Camp Sussex.  
 Lieut.-Col. Campbell and Mrs. Campbell gave a dance at their home at Apohaqui last week in honor of the officers of the 64th.

**ISLAND POET SENDS POEM**

Mrs. Robert Macpherson, West Royalty, has received from her son, Joseph L. some fine verses about the cliffs, and the following poem, which was written by a private in the 31st Battalion. Mr. Macpherson, who enlisted from Peace Crossing last fall, has quite a few island comrades in this western brigade, including H. L. Bethune, W. Stanley and Wendall McKenzie.

**30,000 JARS PRESERVED FRUIT FOR SOLDIERS.**  
 HAMILTON, Sept. 14.—The sub-committee of the board of education met the domestic science teachers, Misses Strong, Haist, Taylor and Campbell and Mrs. Fairley, and John B. Hanna and F. W. MacBeth, representing the Canadian club fruit campaign committee, yesterday. The board of education committee has placed the five domestic science class rooms at the disposal of the fruit campaign committee and the domestic science teachers will have their classes assist in putting up fruit for the Canadian overseas hospitals, in as large quantities as possible. There are twenty-four burners in each class room. It is estimated that the classes will be able to put up 1,000 quarts a day. The fruit growers have intimated that they will send in not less than 5,000 baskets next week. This means 30,000 quart jars of fruit for the soldiers in the hospitals. The churches that are provided with kitchens have arranged to have same in full operation.  
 It will be seen that a great deal of the canning of this fruit must be done at the homes and the co-operation of every woman in Hamilton is required.
