—THE AUTO.—At a large and representative meeting of the Kensington School District held on Wednesday evening, April 23rd, a unanimous resolution was passed opposing the repeal of the "Automobile Act."

—POLICE COURT.—At the Police Court at Summerside yesterday morning the case of Captain Smith of the schooner Great against Henry Gallant, one of the sailors on a charge of desertion, was dismissed. Gallant promised to return to the ship.

—A RESOLUTION.—At the recent session of the Grand Division Sons of Temperance of P. E. Island held at Fredericton on April 24th, a unanimous resolution condemning the running of automobiles in this province was passed as being against the best interests and safety of our people.

—DELAY ORGANIZATION.—On Thursday afternoon the ladies of Clinton assembled in the Hall to hear Miss James' who is at the direction of the Department of Agriculture of this province, for the purpose of introducing the work of Women's Institutes. At the close of an interesting description of the movement there was considerable discussion and it was decided to further consider organization in the section before taking any definite steps in the matter.
