After the reading and approving of the minutes of the last annual meeting and the minutes of Council Col. Moore moved that the Association place on its minutes a resolution setting forth the regret of the Association on the death of the Queen. A committee was then appointed to draft a resolution, said committee consisting of Col. Moore, Major Weeks and Lieut. McDougall.
