THE KARAKULE SHEEP INDUSTRY

(Continued from page one).

Young's success in getting more good rams into America.

When Dr. Young arrived with eleven rams in this country in April this year, I was hopeful that all of them would be brought to his ranches in El Paso and Roswell. I received my first shock when I learned from the Doctor that one ram was killed in quarantine at Baltimore, but was pleased that the remaining rams were sent to El Paso and Roswell, which is not far from our ranch at Middlewater.

In June 1913 I selected our two rams from four rams that were on the doctor's ranch at El Paso, and while there learned from him that they had the best chance of being absolutely unrelated, due to the fact that these rams were raised a great distance apart.

The natives of Central Asia without exception inbred, and so do even those few Russians that have in the past few years managed to get a few sheep out of Bokhara.

I paid Dr. Young \$2,500 cash and gave him two good coarsewool rams of our flock, and secured from him the promise that he would exchange rams with us, in order to prevent inbreeding for four generations, after which time I figured on exchanging with the doctor's associates at Roswell.

On account of the Mexican trouble on the border where the doctor's ranch is located he sold one half interest in his sheep to parties in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, which worried myself and associates greatly, and never having had the unqualified support from some of our stockholders I was in hopes of consolidating our interests with the doctor and associates. In this I failed and more to please the doctor than myself, I sold the entire herd to him, with the understanding that when he has consolidated all good sources of blood supply and formed a strong parent company, a subsidiary company shall be started at Middlewater, in which the doctor and his associates and myself could become interested. I am now considering this proposition which depends somewhat upon my ability to secure the right kind of grazing land in our country.

In reading the circular recently issued by the United States Department of Agriculture, I notice that they have had no satisfactory results in their first cross from such finewool sheep as Merinos, Shropshires and Barbadoes, and the latter when Dr. Young tells me are also seriously contaminated. It has cost us a great deal of money and several years of experimenting to learn that \$10 and \$12 skins can only be produced from Karakule rams, free from finewool where they are crossed to such coarsewool—longwool sheep as Lincolns, Cotswolds and red Persian Fatrumps that are entirely free from finewool admixture, and have the coarsest of wool.

I believe the black faced Highland with its coarsewool when free from fine wool, will excel the Cotswolds and Lincolns. If one is satisfied with \$2 and \$3.00 skins, then one may use Karakule rams with finewool blood in them, providing they are crossed to Lincolns or Cotswolds that have great luster and very coarse wool. If one takes into consideration that ewes whose lambs are killed the first few days after birth, may be bred again the same year, and thus assuring the breeder two crops within thirteen months, (this is true in the southwest) then one may be justified by my advice to all breeders is to start with coarsewool Karakule rams and coarsewool longwooled American ewes, that give excellent results in the first cross. It would appear that it would be for the best interest of the Karakule industry at large, if all the Karakule ewes now in America were bred up to the proper standard by the best rams.

When I bought our first herd from Dr. Young, he exhibited a certificate from the Poltava Agricultural Society of Russia, to the effect that all the fifteen sheep of the original importation were of "plethoric" Karakule variety. The use of the word "plethoric" rather perplexed me, but its literal translation is "full blooded." One needs to look but once at the two good rams, and two

good ewes of the original importation to notice the great difference between the good Karakule and those that are not desirable. Those that desire to satisfy themselves of that fact need but look once at the sheep, now on the ranch of Dr. S. R. Jenkins, where both varieties can be seen and watch the results next Spring when the lambs come.
