NEW SEAPLANE OF DISTINCT TYPE INVENTION OF FRENCH AVIATOR

Is Egg-shaped, With Metal Body and Wings Pointing Backward - Looks for New York to Paris Flight in 24 Hours - Flivver Machine Also Devised.

PARIS Nov 25.—An entirely new type of seaplane has been invented by Lieutenant Charles Nungesser, retired of the French Army, who has the following record: Seventeen wounds, destroyed officially of forty-four German planes and unofficially of sixty-one others the latter falling inside the German line; officer of the Legion of Honor, winner of the Military Medal, the Croix de Guerre with thirty citations, twenty-eight palms and two stars, the military cross, Chevalier of the Order of Leopold, winner of the Belgian Croix de Guerre with silver palm, the Order of Kara-georgewitch, the Order of Michael the Brave, the Serbian decoration for bravery, the Montenegrin Order of Dailio and the Portuguese Croix de Guerre, first class. Nungesser has invested and built within thirty-six days with his able group of young engineers including Visconte Deydier de Pierrefeu, a seaplane totally different from the well-known types. It is simple, compact and powerful with an egg-shaped metal body. But its main feature is wings pointing backwards at an angle of 120 degrees. They are reversible, so as to act as a sudden landing brake, lifting the machine quickly, checking the vast speed it can reach and making possible quick, safe landings from full speed. The wheels of the machine can be detached in a moment. With the craft Nungesser foresees early flights from the heart of Paris to the heart of London. The Ace has two types worked out. They will be known as N-1 and N-2. N-1 is to be an exceedingly cheap but soundly constructed plane capable of being landed anywhere, land or water, in a short space. Nungesser hopes to put out a \$1,000 plane and popularize air travel by air flivvers. N-2 is to be the long distance machine and in it Nungesser has already partially crystallized his dream of a Paris-New York flight in 24 hours. He dreams of floating islands for gasoline, restaurants for passengers, hotel accommodations even. Passengers would have the privilege of stopping over at any of these islands. The service would be daily one so they could be picked up again the next day. Not the least engaging feature of the dream is that passage would be about half as expensive as it is on ocean liners.

THE TECHNICAL SCHOOL Visits the Plant of Davis & Frazer. On Wednesday afternoon the staff and students of the Agricultural and Technical School were given the privilege of spending several hours of interest at the Cold Storage and Packing Plant of Davis & Frazer. Mr. H. Clay, swine grader for the Livestock Branch very kindly took charge of the party. He gave a short address at the school on Hog Marketing conditions and emphasized the points of importance to be studied while inspecting the plant. Mr. Clay gave a practical demonstration of grading according to weight and type, after which the students were allowed to follow the process of killing and dressing. The hogs were driven on the killing platform and from there through the scalding vat to the mechanical scraper; this was an entirely new process to most of the students and was watched with much interest. After the dressing had been completed and the official inspection of the veterinarian carried out, the carcasses were carefully examined and comparison made as to grade, etc. with special attention to "Bacon Type" which is being emphasized so much at the present time for export trade. The manufacture of sausages caused considerable interest as did the curing and smoking processes. The authorities of the school are deeply grateful to those who contributed to the success of the afternoon, which proved not only interesting but a valuable addition to the class room studies.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. MALCOLM BELL.

The people of Victoria and vicinity were shocked and saddened on Saturday morning last to learn that Mr. Malcolm Bell had suddenly passed away during the previous evening. Last March Mr. Bell suffered a stroke of paralysis from which he had not fully recovered, though he was able to carry on his small farm work and had been engaged during the day in putting his buildings in order for the winter, going as late as four o'clock to the shore for sea-weed. About ten o'clock he complained of a pain in his head and was dead before Dr. Boyver could reach him. Mr. Bell leaves to mourn his sudden passing, the widow, who was formerly Miss Boyce, of Bonshaw, one son, Windsor, living on the homestead at South Melville, and two daughters, Annie of Attleboro, Mass., and little Lois at home; also two brothers, George of DeSable, and Frank of Boston, Mass.; also four sisters, Mrs. Graham of Portland, Me., Mrs. Arbing and Mrs. McCabe of Charlottetown, and Mrs. Ferguson of Hampton. Mr. Bell was 62 years of age, and had spent practically his whole life in South Melville, until a fire over a year ago, when he came here. He was a man of rather retiring disposition whose circle of acquaintances was not as large as that of some men, but his neighbors found him to be kind, honest and industrious. The funeral, which was conducted by the Rev. Mr. McPherson, of Hampton, was held at the house on Sunday, burial taking place at Argyle Shore. Messrs. Henry Robertson, Robert Rogerson, Duncan Campbell, Granter McPhail, K. C. Holmes and David Holmes acted as pall-bearers.
