Premier Hepburn Backs Quebec

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
TORONTO, Oct. 12 — Premier Mitchell F. Hepburn today aligned himself with Premier L. A. Taschereau in regard to the stance taken by the Quebec Premier against the reported policy of a company in attempting to reduce the price of newsprint.

In a statement handed out from the Premier's office late today, Mr. Hepburn said: "Having read the statement of Premier Taschereau with respect to a certain paper company operating in the Province of Quebec, which company is alleged to be engaged in a price-cutting attempt on newsprint, I wish to make it known I am heartily in accord with the Premier of the Province of Quebec when he states such a move would be ruinous to the newsprint industry in Canada.


"I am certainly sympathetic towards any and all moves that may be taken that will, in the final analysis, mean an improvement to the working man's cause and the benefit of the Province of Quebec."

The intention of the government of Ontario in the administration of its natural resources to encourage in any way the operators to bargain or make any adjustments that will be injurious to the industry of the workmen engaged therein."

LEAVES WITH SUPPLIES FOR SABLE ISLAND

Thousands Attend Eucharistic Con.

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 12 — Two hundred thousand visitors from the four corners of the earth representing more than 30 nations, gathered on the flat plain of Palermo Park today for the first general assembly of the International Eucharistic Congress.

To all corners of the 1,400-acre park microphones brought the voice of Monsignor Pedro Pascual Parfan, Archbishop of Lima, who spoke on the theme "Christ the King in the Eucharist" and for the Eucharist.

The speech was the climax of the tremendous meeting, during which the predominantly South American audience heard a strong plea to "brother nations of the same origins" to bring about peace between Paraguay and Bolivia in the chaco forest. Monsignor Pie expressed hope that the Eucharistic spirit would induce the belligerent nations to drop their hatreds and settle the ancient boundary dispute in christian fashion.

Earlier in the day the open air cathedral was invaded by 107,000 children with white and yellow eucharistic banners. They came to receive communion from 250 priests.

SWARM OF INSECTS VIRTUALLY WALK AWAY WITH VILLAGE CHURCH

OTTAWA, Oct. 12—Millions of unwelcome visitors interrupted services at a small village church near Ottawa recently. They swarmed over the pews, crept on the floor, covered the windows, and packed every inch of space around the eaves and roof.

Disturbed and puzzled, the congregation called in an entomologist expert from the Dominion Department of Agriculture. He identified the creatures as bird mites,

undergoing repairs and the Montcalm is carrying on the service. Last winter the Montcalm battled ice in the Gulf of St. Lawrence 12 days before landing supplies for the Magdalen Islands.

but whether the mites had suddenly become religious or were agents of the evil powers sent to plague true believers he was unable to say.

In any case it was impossible to hold services in the church. The members refused to share their pews with the little insects because they got familiar and crawled up trouser legs and sleeves.

The expert entomologist recommended a thorough spraying of the church and a bee was planned to do the job. What with the harvest and other things, however, a date was not set for a couple of weeks and by that time the pests had disappeared.

The case was one of the most unusual to come to the Entomological Branch of the Department of Agriculture this year. Large numbers of birds had nested in the belfry and around the eaves of the church. They are believed to have attracted the mites who thrived and multiplied. When the last of the young birds had left the nest the mites sought new victims swarmed into the church and lay in wait for the congregation.

TRINIDAD RAILWAY OFFICIALS HOPEFUL

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Oct. 12—Hopes are expressed by officials of the Trinidad Government Railways that this company will end the 1934 year in a better financial condition than in 1933, despite adverse circumstances tending to increase rather than cut down expenditures.

T. F. Tomlinson, superintendent of the Railways, stated that reductions in operating costs and expenditures were still being made whenever possible but had not been reduced to a minimum. Net annual loss had been cut from £26,800 to £13,000, he said.

One of the chief handicaps facing the railway company this year was the loss in revenue derived from transportation of the sugar crop. Because of the weather conditions the harvest was small and the tonnage carried fell off considerably.
