SWISS FIRE ON GERMAN AEROPLANE.

BERNE via Paris, Feb. 23.—Swiss soldiers opened fire yesterday on an aeroplane, said to have been German, which flew over Bonfil. The machine was struck by machine bullets and the pilot was forced to descend at Ferrette after hovering over the position at Rechesy.

AEROPLANE CO. INCORPORATED

OTTAWA, Feb. 22.—The Curtiss Aeroplanes and Motors, Limited Company, whose incorporation appears in Saturday's Canada Gazette. The company will manufacture and deal in aeroplanes, hydro-aeroplanes, sea-planes, dirigible balloons, and other sea and air craft. Also motor vehicles and motor boats of all kinds. The capital stock of the company is \$50,000.

It is understood that the objective of the Curtiss Aeroplanes and Motors Limited, Toronto, whose incorporation with \$50,000 capital is announced in the Canada Gazette is to manufacture aeroplanes for the British Government and possibly for the Canadian Government.

It is said that parts will be made in the United States, and the assembling be done in Canada. This would obviate any trouble with Germany about the sale of completed aeroplanes by Americans to belligerent nations.

The company is empowered to establish schools for the instruction of pilots and to issue qualification certificates.

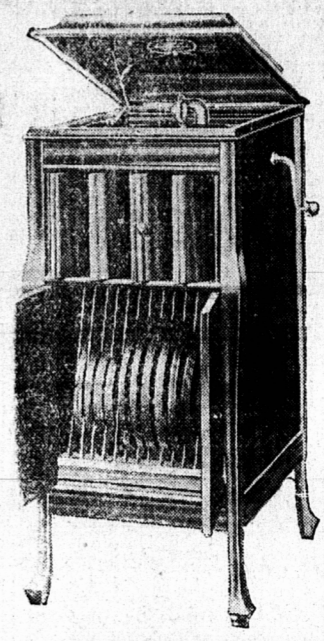
