NEW "KING" TO RULE 1,500,000 GYPSIES

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—Gypsies in the United States have a new "King." He is Frank Mitchell, 43, of Manhattan. According to an announcement to-day in Yonkers, Mitchell will reign over 1,500,000 gypsies in the United States, and will administer their affairs when he is not earning a living for his wife and himself by telling fortunes. Mitchell was elected last Friday at his home, where the chief of the various gypsy tribes are said to have gathered around the bier of the late King, Nicholas John. Mitchell had been assistant to John four years and therefore was considered the heir apparent to the gypsy throne. The gypsy king's subjects include all the gypsies in this country, regardless of tribe, or the land of their origin.

Britain and U. S. Must Control East

TORONTO, Feb. 16.—Great Britain and the United States must remain the dominant powers on the Pacific, William Howard Gardner, vice-president of the Navy League of the United States, declared in his address at a Canadian Club luncheon here today.

There is no half way course for the United States and Great Britain in the Pacific Ocean, where the big things in future world history are undoubtedly going to be happening soon, he declared. Britain must build her Singapore naval base. The United States must strengthen her fleet. Both powers must maintain the predominant strength of their fleets and assume an intelligent and firm policy in the Far East.

Just back from an extended tour of the Far East, which included the site of the Singapore naval base, Mr. Gardner was able to give his audience a rare insight into the factors jockeying for position in one of the greatest political intrigues of the world has ever seen.

Mr. Gardner compared the English-speaking peoples to an idealist facing a bully. "You know," he said, "if you show the slightest sign of fear or retreat, you've yielded once to trouble. If you go to get to a graffer, you are gone. If he defeats you it is really you who defeated yourself. We are going around with a lot of sloppy idealism, deluding ourselves that since we believe it, other people believe it, too."

"There can be no doubt," he said, "that the United States with Canada on her right and woefully undemanding Australia on her left is the front rank of white civilization

facing the Pacific in which the Japanese Empire very naturally intends to become the Britain of the Far East.

After declaring that it was essential for Great Britain and the United States to possess strong navies, Mr. Gardner continued:

"It's a matter of relative indifference to me whether Britain or the United States has the most powerful navy provided the fleets of the English-speaking countries are large enough to maintain peace. The only worthwhile sanction and reliance in the whole far eastern situation is force."

"One of three things is going to happen out there. Either Britain and America are going to exercise firmness, or they are going to withdraw from the far east and allow the Japanese ultimately to secure the hegemony of eastern Asia. Australia and the Pacific or America and Britain may try to steer a midway course between these two positions, of maintaining their position with adequate firmness and withdrawing, if they choose this straddle course it undoubtedly will lead to war."



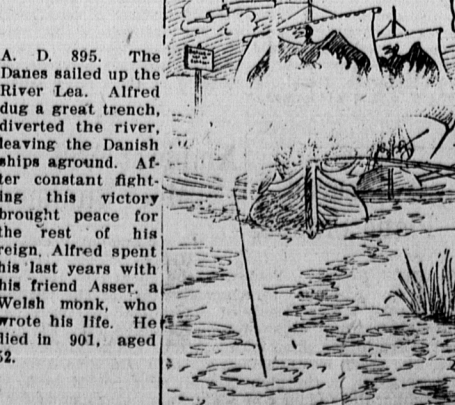
