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**Dinghy Sailors Prepare For Week-long Regatta**

MONTREAL, Aug. 16 (CP)—Dinghy helmsmen from Britain, the United States, Bermuda and Canada converged on the Royal St. Lawrence Golf Club at Lake St. Louis today for the week-long Canadian Dinghy Association's annual regatta.

The competition, staged in co-operation with the American International Dinghy Association, will decide some of the top 14-foot dinghy championships in the world.

The first three races, tomorrow, Thursday and Friday, will be held along a course off Point Claire. The race for the Vicount Alexander of Tunis Trophy will be sailed Aug. 20, starting at Dorval.

Canada will be represented by such outstanding internationalists as Dick Stevenson, John Schwab, Ian MacLean and Doug Woodward of the Royal St. Lawrence Club; Paul McLaughlin and Bill Gooderham, both Canadian representatives at the Olympics last year, and Sonny Hanne of Toronto, and the Kirby brothers of Ottawa.

Bermuda will have Shorty Trimmingsham, Dick Dival, Stanley Ford and Warren Brown, and Britain will be represented by Capt. Charles Curry, Capt. C. Alexander, Keith Shackleton, Peter Scott and Tony Warrilow.

The United States delegation, headed by Richard Fenton of California, made a colorful entry to the lakeshore layout yesterday. A three-car caravan rolled into the

grounds carrying boats and sundry equipment on trailers.

Fenton and his fellow-Americans, C. Kober, Dick Duncan, Thomas Hamlin, C.W. Lapworth and Craig W. Doyle, figured they had travelled 3,340 miles, "farther than the Englishmen had to come."

The 218 Pace, next event on the card turned into another thrill-producing episode. Judd, heavily backed broke a strap going away to fall far back, with Filbert and Josedale Clipper taking to the air likewise. It was a three horse battle, with Sandy D. beating out Yankee Girl and Jerry Lee Volo in the race from the top of the stretch home.

But that dull heat was more than made up for in the next mile. The entire field stayed flat all the way, Josedale Clipper was out in front as they hit the back stretch the second trip, with Judd up on even terms on the outside, but Sandy D. tucked in by driver Allen paced right into the picture at the top of the stretch. He went to the front and in a great race to the wire had too much pace left for the fast closing Judd and Jerry Lee Volo.

Judd finally got his revenge in the final mile. He was out in front at the half; at the three quarters Filbert and Josedale Clipper had moved up on even terms but this time Judd had all the steam necessary, beating off Filbert's final challenge to win by a length with Sandy D. moving fast in the stretch, a couple of strides behind.

**Romeo In Top Form**

The patient efforts expended by "Jiggs" Arbing in getting Romeo in top racing form were rewarded in the final class on the card, as the Arbing-driven horse came through with a straight heat victory.

Actually looking for pacers the winner had moved up on the outside to second place in the first half of the first mile; as they hit into the last end of the picture on even terms and in the stretch just paced by as Bob Canuck and Valley Long finished neck and neck with the former getting the nod.

Again in the second mile driver Arbing was content to trail the field for the first part, but he had Romeo in front at the three quarters and from there in was like breaking sticks with O. K. Volo winning a stout battle for second spot. The third mile saw Romeo prove his worth. Away on the outside, he was still trailing at the top of the stretch but still had plenty left and proved it by coming very fast on the outside for his third straight conquest of the field.

**Mines Conference In N. B. Next Month**

FREDERICTON, N.B., Aug. 16 (CP)—Leading authorities in their field of science and engineering and provincial ministers and deputy ministers from nine Provinces of the Dominion are prominent in the list of delegates coming to the sixth annual conference of the Provincial Minister of Mines, to be held in Fredericton on Sept. 7, 9 and 10th.

In addition, the mining industry will be well represented by industrial and government officials when the sessions get under way in the New Brunswick capital on Wednesday, Sept. 7, it was indicated today at the offices of the Mines Branch, Department of Lands and Mines.

Plans for the transportation of delegates—by air, train and motor—are well advanced and the arrangements in general are nearing completion. A wide variety of subjects already has been approved in the tentative agenda of the conference.

**Boston Braves Manager Goes On Leave Of Absence**

(By The Associated Press)

BOSTON, Aug. 16—The Boston Braves announced tonight that manager Billy Southworth, in poor health for some time, has accepted a leave of absence and will not be with the team for the rest of the season.

President Lou Perini announced that coach Johnny Cooney will run the team as acting manager.

Perini said Southworth, his wife and his daughter have already left in Perini's plane for their home at Sunbury, Ohio.

The Braves announcement said Southworth has been unable to sleep well and has been eating irregularly, and has been worried that his poor health might endanger the club's chances.

He accepted Perini's proposal of a leave of absence and took off from Boston two hours before the Braves called a press conference to announce the change.

Perini and general manager John Quinn expressed opinion that in insisting on Southworth's leave of absence they are "stacking six weeks of the 1949 season against many years in the future, and that in the Braves' plans for coming seasons, this is a worthwhile move."

The Braves' owners and general manager said they made their decision "not merely by the desire to help plan for the club's future but, much more so, to provide for the health and well-being of the man who has contributed so much to the success enjoyed by the Braves in recent years."

Southworth's present contract signed in 1947, has three years to run at a reported annual salary of \$50,000.

The Braves tonight were in fourth place, 13 1/2 games behind the league leaders and a game and a half behind the New York Giants.

The 1949 season thus far has been disappointing to Braves fans as their favorites stumbled in their efforts to repeat the 1948 championship, the Braves' first in 34 years.

As the team continued to languish in the pennant race rumors spread of dissenation among the defending champions. At the start of the season, a Boston newspaper columnist charged the players resented what the writer claimed was Southworth's habit of taking full credit for winning the pennant in 1948.

That storm died down as the season progressed but new reports of jealousy grew as the Braves slipped further back in the pennant race.
