PERSONALS

Mr. T. S. McKay of the Canada Paint Company, Montreal, is making a business trip throughout the Province. He is at the Victoria.

In many countries where they go by the old calendar Christmas is celebrated January 6, the celebration beginning twelve days before.

Dr. Cyrus MacMillan arrived home Saturday night from Montreal to attend his mother's funeral which took place this afternoon. The Doctor will remain here until after the Christmas holidays.

Mr. Justin Hynes wh had the misfortune to break his leg a couple of weeks ago by a fall from the breastwork at the railway yard is making a good recovery in the Charlottetown Hospital.

Mr. S. J. Mansfield, representing the Chamberlain Drug and Chemical Co. of New York and Toronto, left yesterday for Ottawa after making his first trip to P. E. I. in five years. Mr. Mansfield was previously well known to the trade here. He served three years and nine months in France in the Dental Corps and was pleased to be back on the Island once more.

Statement Re Cost of City Street Work

At the last meeting of the City Council, Councillor J. J. McKinnon, Chairman of the Street Committee, submitted interesting figures concerning the street work recently completed for this season.

Councillor McKinnon reported that there were laid 13,318 square yards of concrete base at a cost of \$20,948.99, equal to \$1.57 per square yard. 10,370 square yards of asphalt surface at a cost of \$12,952, or \$1.25 per square yard. 20,580 feet of curb and gutter at a cost of \$13,457. 3,160 feet of sub-drain costing \$1,115. This gives a total of 79,213.88, exclusive of the cost of plant.

The completed street, concrete base, asphalt surface (two inches thick) curb gutter and sub-drain cost \$3.25 per square yard, and some of the concrete work, such as Grafton Street, was 8 inches thick. No other section of the city will require that thickness of base. Councillor McKinnon then compared the cost of asphalt streets with that of macadam. He said that a cubic yard of tone will lay 4 square yards of macadam 9 inches thick; the total cost, including hauling, crushing, spreading, grading, rolling, etc., will amount to \$2.50 per square yard, without the curb and gutter. The latter will cost 47c. additional, making about \$3.00 a square yard for macadam street, which will only last six or seven years, as compared with what is practically a permanent street costing only 25c. per square yard more. The contractor's price for the same work which the city has done with its own plant would have been \$3.75 per square yard. The concrete base is there for all time, and the asphalt may be likened to a carpet, which can be easily patched if it becomes worn.

Mr. McKinnon said that next year's work could be completed with the balance of the money on hand. Next year a thinner concrete can be put down and the cost per square yard would be less than was paid this summer. Then the work can go on more rapidly as the men are more experienced, and moreover the asphalt can be laid more quickly in warm weather. This season had to be put down in the fall. About fifty per cent of the heavy traffic portion of the city was completed this year. Mr. McKinnon said the people are beginning to ap-
