THE City of London had 25 passengers to Belfast and Orwell yesterday afternoon and a large cargo of general merchandises. She returned in the evening with six passengers, 15 cases eggs, and 1 horse.

A VERY concise, informing little book, entitled The Tunnel has been published by Rev. A. E. Burke. It contains the facts regarding the position of this Province in the matter of winter communication and also information as to the feasibility and cost of the tunnel.

A NUMBER of schooners came into port yesterday. The Brilliant is loading east at Fowal wharf, for Pictou, and will sail when tide and wind permits. The schooner Daisy is loading produce at Queen's wharf for Sydney, and will sail Friday. One or two other schooners came in in the evening and anchored out.

THE program for street work and the construction of new sidewalks will probably be arranged in time for the next meeting of the City Council. In the meantime had sidewalks are being attended to as quickly as possible and every effort is made to overcome causes of complaint by citizens on this head.

IN explanation of the delay in starting the construction of the new station The Guardian has been told that the weather up to the 13th of this month was such that the contractor did not consider it fit to begin operations. Sub-contractors for brick and lumber have been made and the materials will shortly be delivered on the station site. The arrival of Mr. Wallberg, the contractor, is expected shortly.

THE Minto returned to port yesterday afternoon. She left last Saturday for Port Daniel, Quebec, charged with the task of finding a wooden breakwater, which had gone adrift from that harbor.

AFTER chasing the missing breakwater here and there it was at last discovered almost at the identical place from which it had broken away. Captain Finlayson therefore brought the steamer home. He reports a great deal of heavy ice in the Gulf, near Paspébiac and Miscou, and the climate very wintry. There is also plenty of snow on the Quebec shore.

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AMONG the arrivals by the mail special last night was a party from New York, bound to the Island for a week's visit. The party are all members of the company controlling the Whitney Glass Works, and consists of the President J. P. Whitney; the Vice President, R. D. Macleod (a native of Prince Edward Island); George Dudley, a Director of the Company; and Gerald Stratton, Manager of the New York Office. THE DOMINION EXHIBITION To be Held in Halifax September 22 to October 5, 1906.

The Dominion Exhibition this year is to be held in Halifax for two weeks at the end of September and commencement of October, and the Civic and Governmental Commission, presided over by Mr. Justice Longley, which has the Fair in charge, now has its main features well mapped out.

In premiums and prizes the sum of \$100,000 is offered for Live Stock, Agriculture, Mining and Manufacturing exhibits. Many enquiries are coming in from points all over Canada for space in the buildings devoted to the various lines of industry and invention.

The grounds, where the big Fair is to be held, owned partly by the City of Halifax and Province of Nova Scotia, comprise many acres, with modern departmental buildings, neat grand stand and a half-mile race track. The buildings are being enlarged by temporary and permanent structures to ensure ample room for exhibitors and visitors.

The Commission is bending its energies to make the Dominion Exhibition thoroughly representative and complete in what may be called its "legitimate" departments, and they are not neglecting the lighter or amusement phases of the show. Races aggregating \$8,000 are offered for a race meeting extending over the two weeks of the Exhibition, when the fastest field of horses that the Maritime Provinces and a large part of Canada beyond can produce will compete.

A Vaudeville, spectacular and mill any display will be presented on a scale of considerable grandeur. In this the 1,400 Canadian troops stationed there will be able to materially assist, and possibly the navy also will be able to take part.

A meeting of the representatives of the leading Railway Lines was recently held in that city when arrangements were completed for transportation from all parts of Eastern Canada as low as have prevailed from the Toronto Exhibition.

Mr. M. McE. Hall, the Manager of the Dominion Exhibition, has had a very large edition of the Prize List printed, which is ready for distribution and which he will be glad to supply to all enquirers.
