The Old Gardener

AMENDMENTS.

Repatriation—That the provisions for the Repatriation of Dependents of Canadian Soldiers and Sailors at Government Expense enacted by the order-in-council of 29th January, 1919 (p. c. 178) and amended by the order-in-council (p. c. 2389) be further amended to include the wives and children under 18 years of age, and widows of ex-members of His Majesty's Forces who were on active service during the war, 1914-1919, and who were bona fide domiciled and resident in Canada on August 4th, 1914.

Date of Application Extended—That the date of application for War Service Gratuity by ex-members of His Majesty's Forces, as provided for in the order-in-council of the 1st December, 1919 (p. c. 2389) be extended from 1st July, 1920, to 31st March, 1921 and that such gratuity be paid to those members of His Majesty's Forces who though they have made application for such gratuity prior to 31st March, 1921, have not returned to Canada at the date of such application, owing to their being detained out of Canada on account of wounds or sickness, but who, however, return to Canada within a month after being physically fit to travel, as certified by proper authority, and become forthwith bona fide domiciled therein.

Imperial Also Benefit—That in cases where a member of the Imperial Forces has fulfilled the conditions of residence in Canada at the outbreak of the war as set forth in the recommendation on Bill No. 10, and containing (P.C. 2389), dated 1st December, 1919, and has either been killed or died in service prior to 1st October, 1919, there be paid to the dependents of such ex-members of the Imperial Forces, who are bona fide domiciled and resident in Canada at the date of making application for the same the portion of War Service Gratuity which they would have received under the provision of P. C. 2389 but for the fact that the member of such Forces on whose account the said portion of War Service Gratuity would have been paid was unable to return to Canada owing to his death as aforesaid, provided that the applications of such dependents must be made prior to 31st March, 1921.

MANUAL TRAINING.

We trust that our school trustees are keeping before them the matter of securing an instructor for manual training for the pupils of Queen Square and West Kent Schools. No time should now be lost in this matter.

AMALGAMATION.

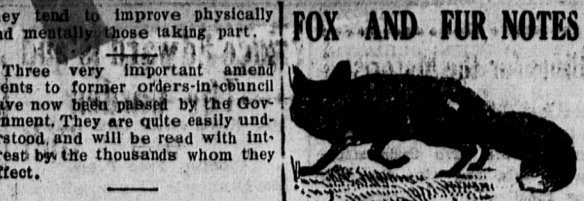

Horse Races At Riverside Park

Matinee Races at Riverside Park, Vernon, postponed from July 1st, took place on Saturday, July 3rd and were witnessed by about seven hundred people. The day was ideal and the track was in perfect condition. Thirteen horses took part. Three horses completed in the free-for-all, Orwell Belle (owned by John Rooney, Orwell) who was always a great favorite on this track, won first place in easy style.

In the 240 Class there were four starters. Queenie, the favorite in this race did not seem to be up to her usual form. A great surprise was sprung by Mr. J. H. McGregor's fast pacing mare, Miss Leyburn Forwood, who only finished fourth in the first heat, won the three succeeding heats without a hitch or a skip and seemed to have a lot of reserved speed, finishing the fourth heat in 2:30, equalling the best time made in the free-for-all. This was good time for a practically green mare as the track was some four or five seconds slow, owing to the previous rain.

In the 3 Minute Class there were six starters, owing to an accident in the first heat Black Bird had to be drawn.

The officials of the day gave entire satisfaction, a proof of which there was not a complaint from either horsemen or people.
