New Regulations Re Shooting of Birds

HALIFAX, April 14.—Mr. H. Lloyd of the Dominion Parks Branch, Department of the Interior, is in the City in connection with the administration of the Migratory Bird Treaty, and the federal bird law. This law is based on the treaty and as Canada intends to enforce the law fully, and as serious penalties are involved, everyone who takes afield with a gun should carefully note the following summary:

Open Season, Both Dates Inclusive.

Black-bellied Plover, Golden Plover, Greater Yellowlegs and Lesser Yellowlegs, August 15 to November 30.

Woodcock—September 15 to November 30.
