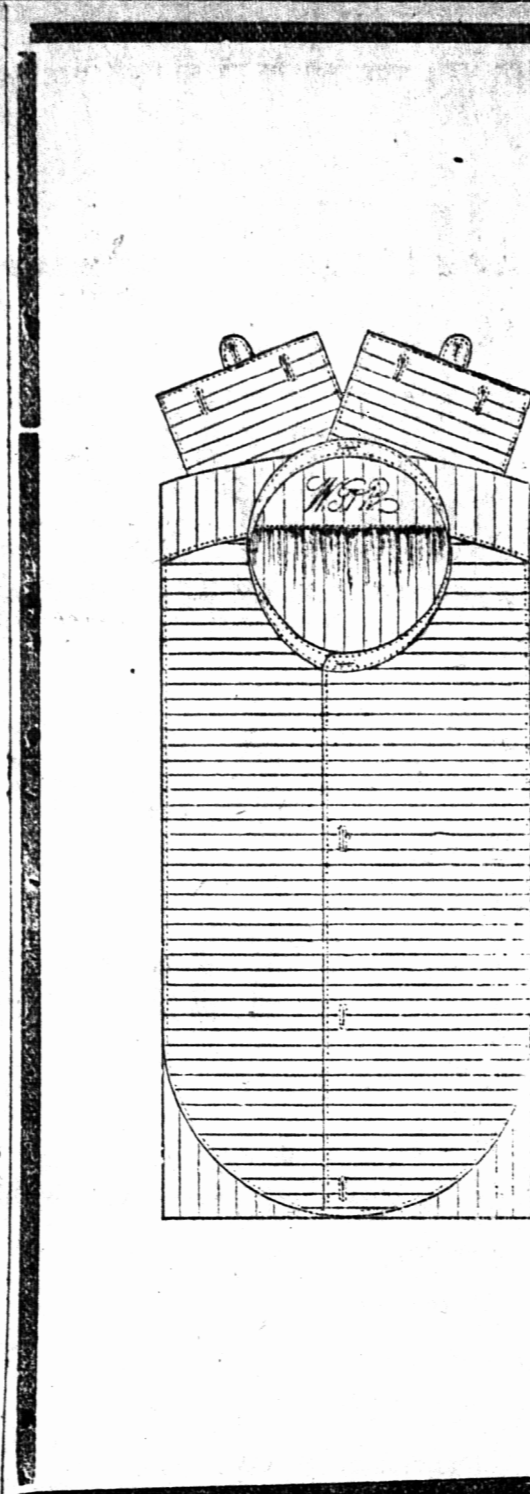

SPANISH SYMPATHY.

ROME, July 2.—According to Vatican circles, one of the principal subjects of the recent conference between Cardinal Gibbons, Archbishop Chappelle and Cardinal Rampolla was how to devise means for counteracting the Spanish sympathies of the priests in Cuba and the Philippines. It is said that the United States through Cardinal Gibbons requested that the necessary measures be taken to secure the immigration of Dutch, Belgian, French and American clergy to Cuba and the Philippines in order to gradually dilute the pro-Spanish character of the priesthood. It is added that the suggestion was favorably received at the Vatican.
