APRECIATION Good Blood Rich And Pure

The admiring and appreciating friends of education in Irishtown right cheerfully assembled at the home of Mr. John M. Evans, Irish town, on the last evening of the school year, to recognize the true worth of Mr. Smith, to express their measure of appreciation for the work performed and to tender to him their sincere regrets at his departure from the school. Mr. Evans capably presided. In order that some record should be instituted by which the event might be definitely recorded, Mr. John A. Whelan, a member of the Trustee Board, read to Mr. Smith the sub-joined address:—

Mr. Charles T. Smith, Teacher, Irishtown. Dear Sir and Teacher.—We, the ratepayers and supporters of the Irishtown school, desire to place on record some testimony of the appreciation in which we hold you, and to offer to you some degree of gratitude for the splendid work that you have performed since you assumed duties here. You came a complete stranger, but your kind and sociable disposition soon erected a monument in our affections that even time shall not destroy. Your strict performance of duty commended our profound respect, as well as our keenest admiration. Thus your marvellous adaptability to the exigencies of sociability stamped you a man of more than ordinary endowment. Withal, you were ever able to enjoy every form of legitimate recreation, as well as to exercise a health moderation over every duty that came under your control. These commendable features were strong supports to your prominent ability as a teacher, and coalesced to make you the desired friend of every circle, and the idol of your own. We regret that you are leaving us, but we know that you can carry your duty and that you can treasure the very best wishes of a grateful and appreciative community.

Signed by the Ratepayers of Irishtown School. Mr. Smith, who never suspected the people of Irishtown of lavishing upon him such candid gratitude, was certainly most effectively disconcerted, and it took some concentration of thought, before he could regain self-possession and in language appropriate and emphatic thanked the good people of Irish town for their practical and forceful expression of good will. Accompanying the address was a beautiful club bag which was presented by Mr. H. Mann, in the name of the donors.
