Ralph is the first volunteer from Kensington to give up his life for the Empire, and while all have genuine sorrow for Mrs. Rogers and their two small children, his father, mother, sisters and brothers, each realize that it is the noblest sacrifice that man can make. Ralph was brought up in Kensington and attended Kensington High School, he travelled considerably through the west and Northwest while still quite young, and came back and settled in his home town a few years ago. He was well off in the world's goods, and all that makes life worth living but when the call for volunteers came he was one of the first to offer his service. His schoolmates and friends are shocked and thrilled by the news of his death and the sympathy of the community is extended to those left to mourn his death.—K.

ATHENS, June 1.—(Via Paris, June 17).—(Precede Paris, Greece).—The demand of the Entente Allied nations on Greece, it was learned here today, are being considerably strengthened, and extended as a result of the anti-Entente demonstrations which broke out in Athens last Monday. The demands were ready for presentation to the Greek government when the disorders occurred but the note probably will not be delivered until next week.
