PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT

The circulation of books this year, has been 4,522. Every year there are books presented to the Library by authors, etc. This year there were only one from the Head Office C. P. R. entitled "The Romance of the C. P. R." by R. G. Macbeth and the other "In Quest of the Souls of Civilization" by Hagot Doglian (Armenian). The books contributed at the Book Tea and a few others given during the year totalled 65. This is considerably less than last year as Mr. and Mrs. and Miss Hensley generously donated a large number of valuable books last year. It is hoped that the public will remember that good books for children or growing are gratefully welcomed and it is suggested that bookshelves in the homes be looked over and any books that can be spared be sent to the Library.

This year 6 McGill Travelling Libraries of 30 books each were secured.

There are 19 current magazines in the Library which can be given out as well as books, some of these are contributed by members, the others subscribed for by the I. O. D. E.

There are good English periodicals including Illustrated London News, etc., and some of the best American and Canadian Magazines such as Harpers, Scribners, Sat. Evening Post, American, The Canadian Magazine, Dalhousie Review, etc. The magazines for Boys and Girls are wisely chosen—they include St. Nicholas, My Magazine, Popular Mechanics, Scout, The National Geographic, etc.

The Public Library is undoubtedly justifying its existence. NOTE—Last year's Magazines are on sale at Holman's Furniture Department at a bargain.

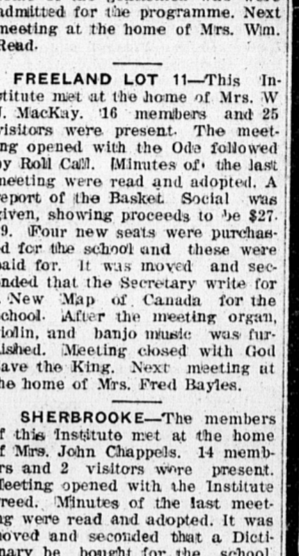
