**Eve's Apple A Peach?**

(G.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) ST. LOUIS, May 2.—It now appears that Eve's apple, which started the world's first family trouble, was a peach. Such was the theory advanced today by Lloyd C. Stark, nursery-man of Louisiana, Mo., and authority on fruit origins.

A small hairy, inedible peach which grows wild at elevations of 7,000 feet in Tibet and China is the daddy of all modern peaches, Stark said. The modern fruit was developed and carried through commerce into Chinese, Roman, Greek and Persian civilizations.

"In more ancient times," said the nurseryman, "the Chinese believed eating a certain kind of peach would bring immortality and preserve the body from corruption to the end of the world. The peach tree was the 'tree of knowledge' to the Chinese, and it may have been that the apple, eaten by Eve in the Garden of Eden, after all was the Persian apple, or as it is known today, a peach."

**Advances In Maternity Rates**

The body of Mother St. Eliza was borne into the College at 4875 Westmount Ave. where it there was chanted by Monsignor Charlier, Vicar General. A Guard of Honour followed the body from the College to the crypt on the grounds of Villa Maria. The prayers were said by Father Ryan, Mother St. Eliza is survived by two brothers, Reverend Angus McDougall and Vincent McDougall, and by four sisters, Mrs. A. H. Macdonald, Mrs. E. B. Ryan, Mrs. B. **Seeks Pardon For Debtor Husband**

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, May 2.—Listed as a woman without a country, Mrs. Grover Cleveland Bergdoll arrived from Germany today to seek a presidential pardon for her draft-dodger husband.

Asserting Bergdoll wanted to return to the United States and reclaim his \$600,000 brewing fortune, which was seized by the government when he fled the country, his blond young wife said.

"His exile of 15 years seems to me to be penalty enough, if he has done wrong. He wants to come home."

As she stepped off the liner Washington with her four small children, attorney general Homer Cummings declared in Washington Bergdoll would receive "no clemency from the department of justice."

The question of clemency would be one for the war department and the president, the attorney general asserted.

Bergdoll, who was captured after a three-year evasion of conscription, was under a five-year military sentence when he escaped to Germany, sailing abroad by way of Quebec.

Mrs. Bergdoll, whose German citizenship was left in doubt when she married the fugitive Philadelphia, during his exile, said her husband had suffered "too much."

"He would come back, if it would not court-martial him," she said. "He is willing to go before the ordinary courts."

Mrs. Bergdoll, who was Berta France before she married Bergdoll, held her 13 months-old son in her arms as she talked, mostly through an interpreter. Her other children, Alfred, seven, Emma, six, and Mina, five, stood by.

"Naturally he wants his fortune," said Mrs. Bergdoll. "We have been living on money allowed us by his mother. That is all we have."

**Allen Must Pay Penalty Says Board**

**Liquor Fraud Case Concludes**

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, May 2.—The preliminary hearing of eight alleged members of a \$5,000,000 liquor conspiracy was brought to an end today with Judge Jules Desmarais taking the on-drawn case under advisement.

At the request of the Crown, Judge Desmarais set May 21 as the date when he will decide whether or not the four Bronfman brothers, Samuel, Allan, Harry and Abraham, F. S. Blair, David Costley and Barney Aaron, all of Montreal, and William Yule of Halifax or any of them, shall be committed for trial on charges of conspiracy together and with other persons to smuggle liquor into Canada and to defraud the Crown of upwards of \$5,000,000 in customs and excise revenues.

Judgment will be rendered earlier if possible, Judge Desmarais said.

**Accuracy Seized By Coastguard**

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW BEDFORD, Mass., May 2.—The seaworn motor launch Accuracy, described by her coast guard captors as one of the worst offenders of the rum fleet, was held under guard here tonight with her crew of nine.

No liquor was found aboard the 15-foot Yarmouth, N.S., craft when the CG-405 of New London, Conn., took her into custody off South Dartmouth, Mass., but an official report to Washington expressed belief she had dumped her cargo of rum on the South Dartmouth shore seeking a trace of any liquor that might have been landed, but tonight reported no success.

The Accuracy was detained under a technical charge of running without lights, officials said. Coast guardsmen reported the seizure took place shortly before daybreak. The squat launch was travelling light at the time. Her clearance papers were understood to call for a voyage from Yarmouth to Bermuda.

Coast guardsmen said they sought to determine why the boat was so far inshore, and were informed by the captain, whose identity was not disclosed, that he had been making repairs in the face of a blow.

The seizure came upon the heels of reports additional customs patrolmen were being concentrated in the Buzzards Bay area to support the government's annual anti-rum campaign against importers of illicit liquors.
