IN MEMORIAM

MR. MICHAEL MOONEY

The community of Eastern Kings was saddened on Sunday, Oct. 4 when it became known that one of its most esteemed and respected citizens, in the person of Mr. Michael Mooney of Greenvale, had been called to his Eternal Home. Mr. Mooney was a gentleman of the old school, all too rare, of splendid attainments of mind and heart and of unusual intelligence. During his long residence in Kings County he was foremost in every endeavor for the advancement, progress and welfare of the community in which he lived. Early in life he was appointed a Justice of the Peace as a recognition of his worth and service, and was on intimate terms with the leaders of public opinion in his day, among whom may be mentioned the late Sir Louis H. Davies, Chief Justice of Canada, who was his close friend and under whom he served as well public service in various capacities as most of his successors in the including Road Inspector in his vicinity.

The Liberal Party, both federal and local, had no more staunch and loyal supporter and adviser.

The late Mr. Mooney was a devout member of Saint Mary's Roman Catholic Church, Souris, and always lived an exemplary Christian life.

His wife, formerly Margaret O'Hanley, predeceased him fourteen years ago, as also a son, John F., who died in Western Canada some years ago. He is survived by two sons Michael G., conductor on the C.N.R., Charlottetown and Joseph, who resided with him, also one daughter, Mary, Charlottetown.

The funeral was held on Oct. 6 from St. Mary's Church, Souris, where the mortal remains were laid to rest in the presence of a large concourse of friends who mourned Mr. Mooney's passing and where a Requiem High Mass was sung by Father Croken.

The pall-bearers were: John A. MacDonald, Jerome Chapman, James Mooney, Marcus Mooney, Charles MacKinnon and George McAuley.

Scout News and Notices

An outstanding example of courage and endurance in connection with two difficult water rescues, one successful, one unsuccessful, was that which this summer won the seldom given Scout's Bronze Cross for 16-year-old King's Scout Eric Earnshaw of Halifax.

During the July holidays a Mrs. Metzler was sunning herself on a rock on the rugged shore at Peggy's Cove, N. S., when a high wave suddenly swept her into deep water. In response to the call for help from others, Scout Earnshaw ran to the scene, throwing off his clothes as he ran, and plunged into the heavy surf. The woman was floating unconscious some 20 yards out. He reached her, and holding her by the head, swam shoreward. He gained footing on a rock, but the receding comber swept him back. He tried again and again, and was near exhaustion when Rena Lutton and Peter Hertzberg, 15 year old visitors from Toronto, jumped in to help him. A Mr. T. E. Brown, who had but one arm, and who could not swim, also tried to assist, but lost his footing on the slippery rocks and also was swept away. While Peter continued supporting the unconscious woman, Eric and Rena turned to saving Brown. One on either side they swam with him to a fisherman's rope stretching from the cliff top, and grasped this. The rope broke, but they succeeded in tying it, and were able to maintain their position against the undertow but could not reach shore.

Meanwhile, with the aid of a rope thrown to him, Peter Hertzberg had reached the shore with Mrs. Metzler.

A boat with a fisherman and his son came on the scene, and took Mr. Brown and Rena and Eric aboard. The people ashore were now calling for Scout Earnshaw, as the only one present who knew how to give artificial respiration. Eric and the others asked the fishermen to put them ashore, but the fisherman refused, declaring their boat would be smashed on the rocks. Finally, exhausted as he was, Scout Earnshaw again plunged into the waves and battled his way ashore, landing further up the bay. He ran back to the prostrate woman and at once began giving her artificial respiration, at the same time directing others about him to make sure her mouth was clear, and how to assist in other ways. Two doctors presently arrived and took over the patient. Unhappily their efforts were fruitless.

Said the Dominion Scout Medal Board report: "The whole story is

one of great gallantry by Scout Earnshaw, Rena Lutton and Peter Hertzberg. Unfortunately it is not within the scope of the Scout Association to deal with any case but that of Scout Earnshaw. The Board ventures to express the hope that the conduct of the two others concerned will be publicly recognized."

Scout Earnshaw is the son of Col. Philip Earnshaw, General Staff Officer, M. D. No. 6, Halifax. Rena Lutton is the daughter of Col. R. L. Lutton, Chief Medical Officer, R. C. A. M. C., and Peter Hertzberg the son of Col. C. S. L. Hertzberg, both of Toronto.

The Earl of Buckinghamshire has been appointed Traveling Commissioner in England for the Boy Scouts Association. The Earl, who was a Scout while at Eton, has a troop of his own at Great Hampden.

The White Horse, a famous old English landmark on the hills above Springhead, Sutton Poyntz, was this summer renovated with pick and shovel and made "really white" by Weymouth Boy Scouts. During their work the boys discovered a huge carved figure of King George III.

The establishment of a bureau of Government Archives in Southern Rhodesia and the collecting of documents concerning the early days of the colony has revealed a series of maps prepared by Lt.-Col. Baden-Powell. They are described as notably well done and complete, and illustrated with merit.

Two 18 year old Polish Sea Scouts who set out three years ago to voyage round the world in a 28-foot yacht have experienced some of the adventures they sought. The seven week's crossing of the Atlantic so battered their boat that they had to dispose of it. They purchased a partially constructed hull, 48 ft. long, finished it, and set off across the Pacific. They were last reported at Sydney.
