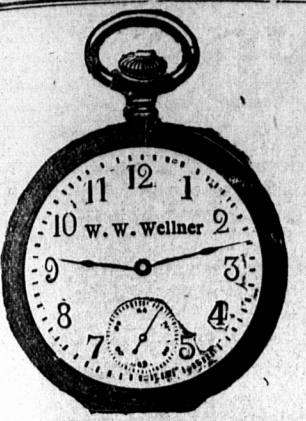

The latest report from the smallpox situation at Waterboro is that all the suspected houses have been quarantined and that the schools and churches have been closed. There have been no deaths and the situation remains practically unchanged.—St. John Sun.

The fifth annual meeting of the Fredericton Farmers' Institute was held at Fredericton on Nov. 8th. A goodly number of members were present representing different localities from Hunter River to Summerfield. The President Joseph E. Bagnall occupied the chair and submitted his annual report. He gave a short address showing what had been accomplished during the past year. The Institute was in a flourishing condition and he was thankful for the Department of Agriculture for sending lecturers for the benefit of the Society. The Secretary then submitted the financial statement of the Institute. Its adoption was carried after the auditors had done their work. A unanimous vote was carried thanking the Superintendent of Institutes for the carefully prepared program for meetings during the incoming year. A communication was read from the "Maritime Farmer" soliciting subscribers at low rates and the Secretary is ready to receive subscriptions for same. Following Directors were elected for the ensuing year: Joseph E. Bagnall, Thomas McKay, R. A. Elliott, Angus Nicholson, D. N. McKay, William McDonald, Hugh McLure, Duncan Buchanan, Richard Smith. Officers for ensuing year are: Joseph E. Bagnall, President (re-elected); Thomas McKay, Vice President; R. A. Elliott, Secretary (re-elected); Angus Nicholson, Treasurer (re-elected); Auditors D. N. McKay, and Hugh McLure. The delegates appointed to attend Institute Convention in Charlottetown on Dec 13th, 14th, 15th are Joseph E. Bagnall and D. N. McKay. The Institute has purchased a fine Improved Yorkshire Boar for benefit of the members from Mr. Brottnier, Ontario. Institute meetings will be held 1st Wednesday at Fredericton and 3rd Tuesday at Summerfield of each month.

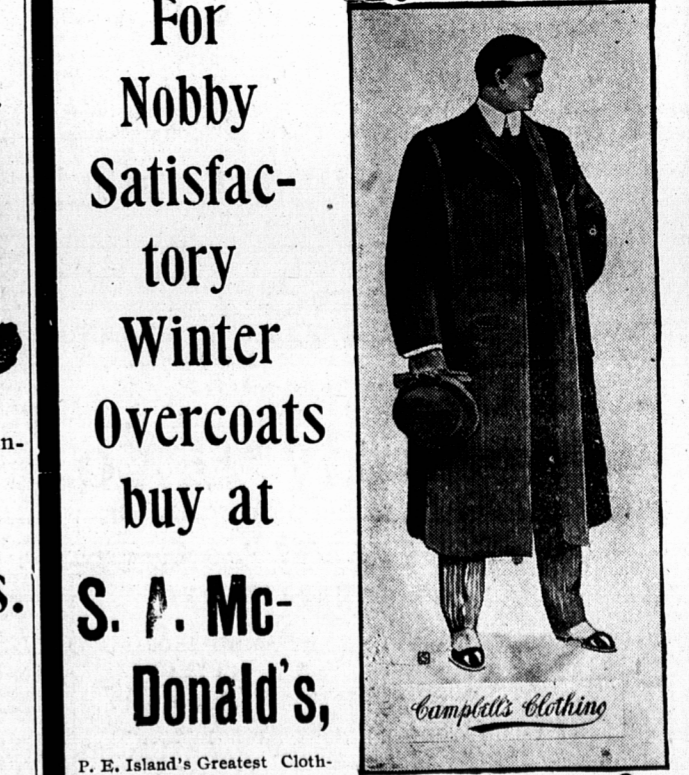
