TWENTY-FIVE HUNDRED TEXAS TRAINMEN NOW OUT ON STRIKE

HOUSTON, Texas, Nov. 14.—Approximately 2,500 trainmen and engine men on the Atlantic division of the Southern Pacific Railroad, known as the Sunset Lines, went on strike at seven o'clock tonight in accordance with an ultimatum presented to the officials of the railroad yesterday by a committee representing 41 four union organizations involved. The walk-out comes after more than six months of futile negotiations which sought an amicable adjustment of difficulties between the road and the men.

An eleventh hour appeal to the federal board of mediation and conciliation by the railroad failed to stop the walk-out, and with engineers, firemen, conductors and trainmen idle from El Paso to New Orleans, the southwest tonight faces a possibility of one of the most serious tie-ups of traffic in years. Railroad officials were silent tonight as to what efforts were being made to relieve the situation, it reports from other points indicated preparations were being made to the coinage of strikebreakers. All rains due to leave terminal points after seven o'clock tonight were delayed until further notice. Those living before that time, it is stated by union officials, will complete their runs, after which their crews will join the other strikers.

A NEW FEATURE ADDED TO THE ALL-RED BUTE

LONDON, Nov. 14.—A new development has just taken place in the scheme which has been before the public for some years for the establishment of an all British line of communication round the Empire. Hitherto the intention has been the establishing of a line of steamers between an Irish port and Canada without touching at a port in the United States.

Financial difficulties prevent the success of this proposal and little has been heard of it lately. The present intention, however, is to include Boston in the scheme, and it is stated that capital has been raised in Boston and Britain for the necessary engineering works and the establishment of a line of steamers running direct from Blacksod Bay, County Mayo, Ireland, to Halifax, N. S., and Boston.

The harbor works at Blacksod Bay and the necessary line of railway from Collooney, near Eligo, Glend, along the Northern coast of Mayo will be begun immediately.

UP TO SUPREME COURT.—Geo. McEwen, who it was said belongs to Prince Edward Island and who was arrested last week on the charge of stealing a horse says a New Glasgow N. S., exchange, was yesterday before the magistrate for his preliminary hearing and was sent up to be tried by the supreme court at its next session.

FOX INVESTMENTS.—The necessity for a good and thorough advertisement of the Island and especially its great industry, fox breeding, is evident from the success with which outside capital is already being attracted by the meagre efforts that have been made to get it. As an instance, it may be stated that on Saturday the chairman of one of the city's foremost fox companies received two substantial commissions to invest in fox stock; one was to the extent of \$3,000 from London, and the other for \$5,000 from Boston.

TO ATTEND FUNERAL.—Rev. H. E. Thomas left yesterday for Medford, Mass. to attend the funeral of his sister-in-law, Mrs. Albrington Thomas, who died at her home there on Tuesday says a St. John exchange. Mrs. Thomas, who was formerly Miss Wood of West St. John, had been ill for some time and her death was not expected. She leaves her husband and three sons. The Rev. Mr. Thomas above referred to is well and favorably known in Charlottetown, having been pastor of the First Methodist Church in this city.

SUNDAY WORK ON I.C.R.—Moncton Times says that a deputation comprising all the ministers of the various churches at present in town waited yesterday afternoon on Mr. Gutelius for the purpose of asking Sunday work on the railway which was not absolutely necessary. Rev. Canon Blam introduced the deputation and spoke on its purpose, as did also Rev. G. A. Lawson, while the other members subsequently emphasized the views set forth. Mr. Gutelius gave the deputation a kindly and sympathetic reception and the members trust that the results of the interview may prove both a benefit and strength to Lord's Day observance.

STORE BURGLAR.—Charlottetown has been for some time immune from the depredations of disciples of Bill Sikes. But this run of good fortune was broken on Friday night, when the store of J. T. Crockett & Co., Grafton street, which is commonly known as the Fish Market, was burglariously entered. Entrance was effected through a hatch at the rear of the store, the thieves passing through the trap door in the floor. They then got into the front store by breaking a pane of glass in the connecting door and appear to have squeezed themselves through. In the front store they robbed the cash register of its contents, about \$2, and appeared also to have made an attempt to open the safe but in this they were unsuccessful. Besides robbing the cash till the burglars carried off a large quantity of canned lobster and sardines, twist tobacco and cigarettes; and then they apparently made their exit by unbarring the back door. The robbery was discovered on Saturday morning on one of the clerks going to open the place for business as usual, and the police were subsequently communicated with.

FOXES.—The St. Andrew's Beacon says that Black's Harbor industries, particularly the fox industry, are very much alive just now. A few days ago a female black fox was sold to E. E. I. parties for \$8,000, and a valuable male purchased. The farm has ten pure-bred blacks, several blues from Alaska, a number of crosses, and about fifty reds.

NEW PASTOR INDUCTED.—Rev. John P. MacNeill, of Alberton, P. E. I., will be inducted today says Thursday's Frederickton Gleaner, as Presbyterians minister at Chipman, Rev. J. H. A. Anderson, of St. John, will preside and address the minister, while Rev. Thomas Mitchell will address the people. Rev. Dr. MacVicar will also assist at the induction.

SACKVILLE STONE BEST.—A fact of interest to New Brunswick people was told The Standard Friday evening by Mr. Pickard, manager of the Sackville Freestone Company. It appears that when tenders were being called for the construction of the terminals for the car ferry to Prince Edward Island, tests were made by stone taken from quarries in different parts of the province. Under these tests the Sackville stone stood best, and is now being used in the work.

DIED IN THE WEST.—Mr. R. T. Oulton, Little Shemogue, N. B., received a telegram on Friday conveying the sad news of the death of his daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Broderick, who resided in Montana. Death was due to paralysis and deceased was sick only a week. She leaves one son, Russel, who resides in Prince Edward Island and who reached her before her death. The remains will be brought home and interment will be made in Fernwood cemetery, Port Bland.

SUCCESSFUL WORKERS.—The Presbyterian Witness says:—We are pleased to hear that Dr. McPhail, late of Mount Stewart, P. E. I., who for the past two years has been missionary of the church of Scotland in St. Vincent, West Indies, is meeting with such success. A year ago a house with an acre of land was purchased for a manse, Mr. McPhail himself contributed \$500 for this purpose, and \$250 additional to wipe out the debt on the property which cost \$2250, and is said to be worth much more than this. Dr. McPhail is the only Presbyterian minister in the colony of St. Vincent. He contemplates a furlough next summer when he will probably visit friends in Canada.

APPLE PACKING.—A new bulletin entitled "Modern Methods of Packing Apples and Pears," has recently been issued by the Dairy & Cold Storage Branch, Ottawa. The author is Mr. Alexander McNeill, Chief of the Fruit Division, one of the greatest authorities on this subject in America. The bulletin is profusely illustrated, well written and quite up-to-date in every respect. Barrel packing is first dealt with; every motion from the "Facing to the Tailing" of the barrels is very clearly explained. Photographs of barrels during the various stages of packing, with drawings of the different makes of presses, stencils, etc. are shown. Box packing is then taken up and no series of lessons by an instructor could show the various operations more clearly. Photographs of every step are given. Any person can, with the assistance of this bulletin and a little practice, become sufficiently expert to pack his own fruit in boxes or barrels for either the local or foreign market. Copies may be obtained from the Fruit Division, Ottawa or the Fruit Inspector, Charlottetown.
