Berry Growers Co-operative Ass'n. Formed

The organization of the Prince Edward Island Berry Growers Co-operative Association, Limited, was completed at a meeting held recently at Mount Stewart.

It was decided that the organization be incorporated under the Co-operative Associations Act and that the standard bylaws under supplementary bylaws, in the drafting of which assistance was given by Mr. W. H. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, and Dr. Croteau, professor of economic and sociology at Prince of Wales College and St. Dunstan's University.

The directors of the new association are Messrs. Fred Charvillat, East Point, James E. Dingwell, North Lake, John MacKinnon, Goose River, J. M. Arsenault, Mr. Carmel, Fulton Douglas, Fulton Coffin, S. M. Shearman, Mount Stewart, and L. H. Maccaisie, Jr., Head of Hillsboro.

The object of the association, as set forth in the bylaws, is the production, processing and marketing of cranberries and other small fruits, the head office to be at Mount Stewart, with a board of directors, membership being open to any grower of the product of a fee of 50 cents. The fiscal year of the association will end January 31. The annual meetings to be held in February at Mount Stewart.

The authorized capital of the association will be \$10,000, the shares to have a par value of \$5.00 each.

The bylaws provide that all products must be delivered to the association in a reasonably clean condition, free from insects, frost injuries, and unnecessary refuse; that where a government grade does not exist for a product the grading regulations will be determined by the board of directors; that all products must be graded and sold according to grade.

The management is authorized to refuse shipments not up to standard, subject to the board of directors.

The bylaws also provide that an advance payment be made to each contributor after the berries have been graded, and that a final settlement be made at the termination of the year's business, also that each grower receive a detailed statement of his account with the Association.

Contract forms are being sent to all growers in the Province. It is estimated that about 300 tons of cranberries are produced annually in Prince Edward Island. Of this amount the Association is prepared to handle between 40 and 50 tons this year.

In accordance with assurance previously given by Hon. W. H. Dennis, Minister of Agriculture, grading equipment has been purchased by the Provincial Government. This equipment is expected to arrive shortly and will be installed in a building provided by the Association. It will have a grading capacity of 50 barrels per day. Excavation work is now in progress for a cannery which the Association is constructing at Mount Stewart, which will not only serve for canning fruits and vegetables but also lobsters and other fish in season.

MONCTON, N. B., Sept. 12-The appointment of George D. LeBlanc as district passenger agent of the Canadian National Railway at Moncton, N. B., is announced by R. J. S. Weatherston, general passenger agent, in a circular issued here today. Vice John H. Corcoran, who is retiring after forty seven years of loyal and faithful service, the appointment to be effective September 19th next. Hugh C. MacFarlane, assistant to the general passenger agent, Moncton, succeeds Mr. LeBlanc.

The retiring district passenger agent was born in Charlottetown, P. E. I., September 18, 1872, and commenced his railway career as a clerk in the mechanical department of the Intercolonial Railway in Moncton on October 24, 1890. Two years later he transferred to the general passenger agent's office and continued in that department until July 31, 1911, when he joined the service of the Grand Trunk Railway as travelling passenger agent at Moncton and on April 1, 1919, was made general agent. On the incorporation of the Grand Trunk Railway into the Canadian National Railway system on December 1, 1920 he was made general travelling agent in the general passenger department in Halifax on December 16, 1924, was appointed general steamship agent with headquarters in Halifax throughout the winter season and at Quebec during the summer. He was appointed district passenger agent at Moncton in August 1930. Mr. George D.
