PAYS OFFICIAL VISIT—Dr. Ira J. Yeo, Chairman of the Board of School Trustees, has during the present week, paid an official visitation to each classroom in the four City Public Schools.

POLICE COURT—At the Police Court yesterday a motorist charged with operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor was sentenced to spend twenty days in jail. The same man charged with unlawful possession of liquor was fined \$500.00 and costs or in lieu of payment sentenced to six months in jail. A drunk and incapable was fined ten dollars and costs or 15 days in jail.

BERLIN, Nov. 5-(AP)—Germans will pay fines proportionate to their pocketbooks under a new penal code disclosed today by Minister of Justice Franz Guertner and legal experts.

The code is based on the theory that fines should not be absolute but should be related to earning power of the offender. Thus, in stead of the fine being fixed at 500 marks for a particular mischief—a court may assess an offender five days in come. In the case of a wealthy man this might be 500 marks, while for a poor man it might be but 3l.

Murder and kidnapping for ransom will be punished by death, but persons attempting to commit suicide will go unpenalized.

The performing of abortions is a crime under the new code, and prison sentences will be imposed for "publicly inciting the limitation of the number of offspring."

An insulting remark about Reichsfuehrer Hitler may be enough to send one to jail, and the man who speaks disrespectfully of the German army's war deeds will be punished.

When personal honor is at stake, men may duel.

LONDON, Nov. 5-(CP CABLE)—The battleship versus bomber controversy remains basically unsettled, according to the report of a sub-committee on imperial defence published today.

The report emphasizes the necessity of further exhaustive experiments but says that on the basis of present knowledge the battleship appears an essential part of a navy operating on the high seas.

The Admiralty does not claim that battleships are invulnerable to air attack, says the report, but that modern improvements in the protection of anti-aircraft gunnery make them at least no more vulnerable to bombing than to gunfire. The value of anti-aircraft fire, however, is most difficult to estimate on the basis of present experiments and further trials are necessary.

A summing up of the information available at present leads the sub-committee to believe that the day of the battleship is not over and that to cease building them would lead to grave risk of disaster.

No details of British tests are given. But the appendix gives published results of United States tests and quotes the American official conclusion that battleships are still essential.

Lindbergh Tries Out New Plane

READING, England, Nov. 5.—Col. Charles Lindbergh took to the air as pilot of his own machine today for the first time since he came to England.

He made a test flight from Reading airdrome in a plane which he makes assert is the fastest light touring monoplane ever built in this country. Lindbergh himself helped design it.

Dubbed "Flying Caravan" by the press, the plane is fitted with tandem seats easily convertible into bunks. Large gas tanks are unusually long range and it is said to be capable of flying non-stop for 1,000 miles at 200 miles an hour.
