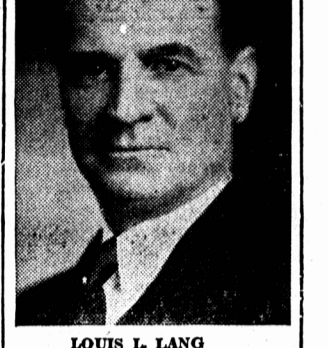

Six C. W. A. C.'s leave the province this morning for Halifax. The following are the names and addresses of the girls: Rita Mabel Curran, Pleasant Grove; Dorothy Mary Walsh, Albany; Marie Arsenault, St. Bernard; Mary Teresa Gaudet, Tignish; Elsie Mae McGreggor, O'Leary; Mary Jeanette Kinch, Tignish. This brings the total number of girls from this province already enlisted with the C.W.A.C.'s up to 25.

Butter Rationing Details Given

Mrs. E. S. Coffin, Chairman of the Women's Regional Advisory Committee, spoke to the students at the Home Makers' Short Course at Prince of Wales College yesterday afternoon. She explained in detail the regulations of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board regarding the rationing of butter. Answers to the six main points of the rationing as it applies to the Canadian rural population were given as follows: (1) All butter producers should have registered with the local rationing board before January 31st, whether butter is made on the farm to be sold or not.

(2) The local ration board should receive registered with the brown coupons, from one to nine, to cover the amounts of butter on hand according to the number of people in the household. (3) When these coupons are turned in they should be accompanied by a statement as to the amount of butter on hand. The new rate of consumption per person is one pound for every three weeks. (4) If butter is made on the farm, the butter coupons must be collected from the customers to cover their purchases at the proper date.

(5) If butter is made and traded in at a neighborhood store, or sold to the storekeeper for cash, the proper amount of coupons or the proper documents to cover these purchases must be collected from the storekeeper. (6) The coupons collected from the storekeeper, together with the coupons from the household must be turned in to the local ration board at the end of each month.

If butter is made on the farm, the butter coupons from the family ration books cannot be used to buy butter anywhere else. Household needs must be supplied from the butter made on the farm.

Ration Coupon Expiry Dates

There is a good reason why ration books have returned to them after they have made application in person for Book No. 2, February 19 to March 7, at one of the local ration boards issuing centres. The present book contains that precious Spare Brown C. butter coupon No. 9 due March 1st and is good for one half pound of butter. This coupon expires March 14.

Mr. G. H. Harbour, Regional Ration Superintendent, Charlottetown, points out that green coupon "lucky 13" for tea or coffee will be valid February 22 and pink coupon No. 13 for sugar is also valid February 22. Once these pink and green coupons are due they have no expiry date.

Prince Edward Island Protestant Orphanage has 144 dresses, pajamas, sweaters, nightgowns etc. and most enthusiastic letters were read from Miss Beers the Matron and from the Trustees. The Annual Birthday Box was sent to her Majesty, Queen Mary for her Charity Maternity Home in Cheshire. In this connection three or four letters were read of thanks from the Queen, through her Lady-in-Waiting. Mention was made of a magnificent donation from the Quebec Branch of the Queen Mary Needlework Guild, through its energetic President Mrs. Lorenzo Evans of 235 garments and 25 large pieces of salvage linen, sent to her Majesty's Maternity Home through us and which added greatly to the splendid display of work at the home of the President, last May. The Maternity Home of the war effort had good hearing. Parcels were sent to the Port of St. John, to Sydney Naval Control, to H.R.H. Princess Alice, for the Free French, in Plymouth and London relief, to individual ratings on Atlantic Patrol, to H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte and to the Canadian Magazine Exchange Halifax containing knitted comforts and 44 garments and quilts. Many letters from Merchant sailors testified to the satisfaction in sending parcels to the Canadian Magazine Exchange, Pickford and Black Wharf. In some cases comforts leaving here on Monday were actually on the Atlantic by Wednesday. 72 bottles of Home made Jam and pickles were sent to H.R.C.S. Queen Charlotte, when arrangements for eating in were completed. The Guild has lost four of its members through death, Mrs. Dewar Past President and member of the Executive, Mrs. W.H. Prowse, Mrs. George Robertson and Mrs. Kent. Mention was also made of many kindnesses from the late Mr. J.A.O. Gordon and from Mrs. H.J. Palmer, a well wisher and benefactor. Again thanks are due to Miss Lena McLure who donated the proceeds of her Pupil Recital to the funds, to Mr. Walter Beers for War-bro samples, to Miss Elizabeth McRae and to the ladies of the Mount Herbert United Church for afghans and quilts. Money contributions were also made to the Red Cross to Russian Relief and to the making of jelly by the Food Administration Section of the Canadian Red Cross Corps.
