(By Alburn West) (Associated Press Staff Writer) RIO DE JANEIRO, Jan. 19—(AP)—Reluctant Argentina, persistent in breaking relations with Germany, Italy and Japan, has given until Thursday to decide whether she will join the other Americas in a solid front against the Axis.

BERKELEY, Calif., Jan. 19—(AP)—On the alkali deserts of six western states there are 500,000,000 pounds of natural rubber—enough to supply the United States for the month—ready for immediate harvesting.

BERLIN, Jan. 19—(German broadcast recorded by AP)—German generals fighting in Russia "not only have to bear the physical strain like their soldiers, but also the responsibility for the fate of their men, and for the outcome of the fighting."

BOUNDARY BAY, B. C., Jan. 19—(CP)—A Royal Canadian Air Force training plane collided with the tail of another aircraft near the No. 18 Elementary Flying Training School here today and both crashed, killing two student pilots and an instructor.

OTTAWA, Jan. 19—(CP)—Transfers of high Canadian army officers from the policy of giving them more experience in overseas operations and returning experienced men to the Dominion, were announced today by National Defence headquarters.

LONDON, Jan. 19—(CP Cable)—PO. T. C. Rigler, D.F.M., who once shot down three German planes within an hour, was badly wounded in a flight over enemy-occupied territory but brought his battered Spitfire safely to base.

HARTFORD, Conn., Jan. 19—(AP)—Premier U. S. of Burma, arrested by British authorities for conspiring with the Japanese, was a "ring leader of Burmese" who hampered traffic using the Burma road.
