Jubilee Boosts
Derby Prospect

EPSOM DOWNS, Eng., May 29.—(G.P.)—Undiminished enthusiasm of the King's silver jubilee promises to make the 15th running of the Derby June 5 one of the most colorful renewals of the blue riband of the turf.

Always a great popular carnival, the Derby this year is expected to attract a record crowd to see an unbeaten colt essay that most difficult of equine feats—victory in the mile and a half of the greatest of turf classics. The Aga Khan's Bahram will be the people's choice.

Much as a royal victory would be acclaimed in this year of Their Majesty's silver jubilee, it will not come in the Derby. His Majesty, who has yet to win the Epsom feature, has no colt left in the race although his Fairhead may have a chance in the fillies' classic, the Oaks, run two days later over the same course.

It is 26 years since the royal purple, with scarlet and gold, flashed first past the winning post in the Derby, that being the occasion of Minoru's victory for King Edward the year before George and Mary ascended the throne. Previously Diamond Jubilee, foaled in the year of Victoria's Diamond Jubilee, 1897, entered the select circle of Derby winners in the 1900 running, also for Edward. He scored the only other royal victory entered on the Derby roll that goes back to 1780, with Perseus in 1896.

Their Majesties will be here with others of the royal family for the Derby and the occasion has all the earmarks of being one of the biggest spontaneous popular greetings for the King and Queen that old Epsom has yet seen.

All the prestige that Bobsleigh lost in the Guinness he regained a few days later by winning the Newmarket Stakes. He beat easily Hatan, by two lengths, and as Hatan was rated only a pound inferior to Bahram in the official two-year-old handicap the improvement in Bobsleigh was obvious.

The Newmarket Stakes was at a mile and a quarter, whereas the Guinness was only a mile, and Bobsleigh can improve further in the eyes of his supporters. His time in that race incidentally was just a fifth of a second short of that set last year by Windsor Lad, who went on to win the Derby and St. Leger.

Bahram is by the great sire Blandford, who died recently. Other Blandford colts are Windsor Lad and Tripo, another Derby winner, and the unbeaten French champion, Brantome. Bahram has not the length of stride or the range of Lord Derby's colt, who is a Gainsborough offspring, but his compact frame carries plenty of strength. From all indications it should be another test between a good little horse and a good big one.

Those pinning their hopes on Bobsleigh to topple the unbeaten candidates also comfort themselves with the saying, "fourth in the Guinness, first in the Derby." Since the war this old maxim, and since the war only Papyrus and Manna have landed both classics.

The Derby problem of 1935, barring upsets which can never be ruled out of discussion of the foremost of the five classics, boils down to the question: Has Bahram the stamina for the gruelling 1 1/2 mile journey, and will Bobsleigh, backward in training, be at his best?

At a special meeting of the Brudenell Women's Institute held Tuesday evening, May 21, the following resolution, moved by Mrs. Russel MacGregor, seconded by Mrs. T. K. Cameron, was unanimously adopted:

Whereas a movement has been inaugurated in this province petitioning the Dominion Government at Ottawa to assist the farmers in financing their potato crop by paying them a bonus of ten (10) dollars an acre on the crop of 1934. Therefore be it resolved that the Brudenell Women's Institute assembled in special meeting endorse the request as above outlined.

Further resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the representatives of King's County at Ottawa, namely Hon. John A. Macdonald, Senator J. J. Hughes and to the Minister of Agriculture, Mr. Sanford Phillips, to the Director of Women's Institutes and to the press requesting them to support this movement.

At a special meeting of the Bonshaw Women's Institute held May 24th for the purpose of discussing the potato bonus, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas the potato growers of this province have been unable to sell their potatoes at a price equal to cost of production and find themselves in very straitened circumstances, and whereas the farmers of the western provinces have received a bonus on wheat, this province paying its share, and whereas this province is in just as serious circumstances, therefore be it resolved that we request the Dominion Government to grant the potato growers a bonus of \$10 an acre up to six (6) acres on their 1934 crop, and be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be sent to the federal members of this province to be presented to the government at Ottawa.

JOHN FRANCIS CANNON

As the glorious sun was rising in the eastern sky on Tuesday, May 21st, heralding the approach of another day, the pure and spotless soul of John Francis Cannon, of Mount Mellick, winged its way to God, there to dwell in that Heavenly Home which God has prepared for such as he. Three months of suffering cheerfully borne in loving resignation to God's Holy Will, completed the measure of a virtuous life of fifty years, a life devoted generously to the welfare and happiness of his wife and family.

He was a man much loved for his amiable qualities, a kind husband and loving father. He has left a vacancy in the home that can never be filled. Not only in the home will he be sadly missed, but also in the neighbourhood as well, where he was always ready to help those who needed his assistance in sickness or in trouble. Always kind and generous, he had a welcome for everyone that entered his home. His remains were tenderly laid to rest in the quiet cemetery at Verpon River. His eyes closed forever to the things of this life, those willing hands are crossed forever over a loving and pulseless heart, but the memory of John Cannon will live forever in the hearts of those whose pleasure it was to have known and loved him. May his soul rest in peace.

SCHOOL GIRLS TRAINED AS HOME-MAKERS

In a small house in Willesden, Eng., nearly 200 elementary school-girls are being taught how to be perfect hostesses when they grow up.

This is part of a new educational scheme which is being developed by Dr. E. Davies, Director of Education, to train girls as home-makers as part of their ordinary elementary schooling.

Groups of girls from the senior classes in neighboring schools spend a whole day in this model home once a week.

The house, which is a disused school building, has a reception hall, a lounge, a kitchen and scullery, a bedroom and a bathroom. It also has a small garden which the girls are planting. Every day the house is cleaned and swept from top to bottom and meals are cooked and served.

The bed is made every morning though no one has ever slept yet at this model home.

UNABLE TO COOK

READING, Eng.—"Few girls today know how to cook," said Principessa Alice recently in opening a Women's Institute Exhibition "They give their husbands indignation."

The celery plant, known to botanists as "aplum groveolens," is a biennial in so far as seed production is concerned but is grown as an annual for market purposes. Its distribution is world-wide and the plant inhabits marshy places in its natural condition. It belongs to the great family which includes parsley, carrots, parsnips, caraway, and fennel.
