MINTO ARRIVES.—The Minto arrived in Charlottetown at 11.15 a. m. yesterday from Pictou with 60 sacks of paper and letter mail, express, 26 tons of freight and 12 passengers. She will leave on return to Pictou this morning.

INWARD TRAINS.—The eastern accommodation arrived in Charlottetown yesterday at 12 noon, fifty five minutes late; the western accommodation at 12.20 p. m., on time and the Summerside at 5.15 p. m., on time.

MINES IN P. E. I.—The Canadian Magazine has an article in its February issue on the shell mines of Prince Edward Island from the pen of Rev. F. A. Wightman, Souris. Several illustrations are also given with the article showing how the shells are used as a fertilizer on the fields, the oyster shell digger at work, waiting at the mouth of the pit, at work at St. Peter's Bay and finally a photo of a mud special (from the oyster beds) made up on the P. E. Island Railway. The article shows a careful study of the industry and is clearly and well told.

JOLLY STUDENTS.—The inward trains yesterday were crowded with jolly students coming to Charlottetown to take the Short Course in Agriculture. The boys were all eager to begin work and delighted with the opportunity to see their homes. One young man in surveying the land, while coming in on the western train, had the misfortune to lose his cap and was somewhat anxious to get out after it but his companions consoled him with the remark that he could lose nothing by taking "the Short Course short of a cap." He stayed on board.

SPLENDID LECTURE.—A large and interested audience gathered in St. Peter's schoolroom last evening to enjoy A. A. Bartlett's lecture on Beautiful Madrid. The lecturer's eloquence is well known to Guardian readers and the handling of his subject, Madrid, a detailed account of which has already appeared in the Guardian was up to his usual brilliant standard. With exquisite artistic taste his illustrations were chosen and with his personal knowledge of the scenes portrayed, he made the lecture very entertaining. Mr. Burke showed the views clearly and steadily and altogether the evening was most enjoyable. A hearty vote of thanks was passed by Canon Simpson to Mr. Bartlett who made a fitting reply.

GOOD MEETING.—J. Wesley Frost, American Consul, gave a very instructive talk on "Some features of modern writing," before the Women's Club, Charlottetown, on Saturday afternoon. Mrs. Arthur Weeks occupied the chair and there were about twenty members present. Mr. Frost commented on the change in public taste, which he said, is becoming more fastidious, he would say, squeamish, says an exchange. He said that the writing of such poets as Ben Johnson, Shakespeare, Herick and Robert Burns could not be published to-day, just as they were written. He pointed out that this taste on the part of the public would have a tendency to make writers stilted and unnatural in their style. He was a great admirer of Burns, but he said that if that poet were alive to-day and were writing now as he did when he produced "Tam O' Shanter" that some of his books would be publicly burned on the ground that they were vulgar. It is to be hoped that Mr. Frost may be prevailed upon to give his talk again to a mixed audience, so that gentlemen as well as ladies might get the benefit of it.

A FRENCH AVIATOR FLIES ACROSS THE PYRENEE MOUNTAINS

MADRID, Jan. 24.—M. Bider, a French aviator, who left Pau, France, at dawn today in an attempt to fly by aeroplanes across the Pyrenees from France to Spain, accomplished the perilous flight in about 512 kilometers, about 317 miles, in five hours and thirty-five minutes. The weather throughout was very bad, rain falling heavily. The people here believed that on account of the bad conditions Bider would abandon his flight and the aerodrome was deserted when he arrived. The airman ascended to what was estimated to be about 9,000 feet, and then set his course in a straight line over the peaks. He descended once at Guadajajara, Spain, to fill his tanks with gasoline.

POPE'S DONATION.

ROME, Jan. 27.—The Pope has given \$60,000 to found a school near here for youths desirous to be school teachers to counteract the anti-clerical attacks against the religious instruction in schools.

A SAD DEATH.

TORONTO, Jan. 27.—Mrs. Crawford wife of a railway section man died on Friday after giving birth to triplets. Two of the babies are dead the third will likely live. The mother is thirty-five years old and has borne fourteen children—triplets three times, twins twice, one single child. Only four are now living.

OIL TANK STEAMER MAY HAVE FOUNDERED DURING HURRICANE

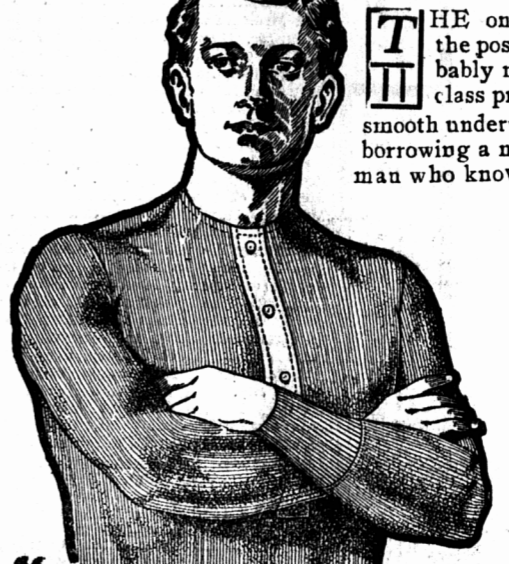
NEW YORK, N. Y., Jan. 24.—Hint of a possible sea tragedy is contained in the report of the German tank steamer Energie, which arrived late today from Tuxpan, Mexico, to the effect that on January 17, in latitude 27.10 longitude 91.26 in the Gulf of Mexico, she passed through an oil field on the ocean's surface. Capt. Rees expressed the opinion that the phenomenon had probably been caused by the sinking of an oil barge or tank steamer in the vicinity.
