The Markets

MONTREAL, March 4.—On account of the much milder weather prevailing throughout the country the production of eggs has steadily increased, and in consequence the receipts here are much larger and somewhat in excess of the daily requirements, consequently an easier feeling prevails in the market and lower prices are looked for in the near future. The demand for supplies today was brisk and an active trade was done in a jobbing way at 50c per dozen. The receipts today were 3,027 cases, as against 1,163 for the same day last week, and 1,155 for the corresponding day a year ago. The stock of fresh eggs in store in Montreal on the first of the month showed an increase of 1,274 cases, as compared with the same date last month, and an increase of 1,667 cases with a year ago while the stock of cold storage eggs showed a decrease of 2,720 cases with a month ago, and a decrease of 494 cases with a year ago.

Receipts of live and fresh-killed dressed poultry are now so light it is somewhat difficult to quote the market accurately, but it is reported that higher prices are being asked in the country for some lines.

A large percentage of the chickens coming forward are coarse and stagers and these are now being classed as cocks. Frozen poultry is moving at about the same prices as fresh dressed, but the demand at present is not quite so keen as it has been of late. The next Jewish holiday is on March 24th, for which live turkeys, hens and heavy fowl will be wanted.

We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows:

REPORTS OF WOMEN'S INSTITUTES OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Montague Women's Institute held its regular meeting in Graham's Hall on the evening of March 1st. This was also the annual meeting of the club. There were thirteen women present. Miss Carruthers, Assistant Supervisor, was present. After the reading of the minutes of the last annual meeting and of the last regular meeting of the Society, there followed the reports of the President and the Secretary for the year. Owing to the changing of the date of ending for the Institute year, from June to March there have been only nine months' work to report but a great deal has been accomplished in that time. Over \$400 has been raised during the year, which, with \$300 brought forward from the year before makes a total of \$735. The members made an agreement with the school board to reseat one of the rooms of the school if the Board did the same for another room. This was accomplished at a cost of \$310. \$97 was raised for the British Empire War Relief Fund. \$200 was realized from a tea and bazaar. \$245 of the Institute funds has been donated to the Montague Community Improvement Society which has been lately organized by the men and with whom the women of the Institute are co-operating. Aside from the regular work of the Society the members prepared and presented a concert to raise funds for the improvement of the town. \$175 was realized in this way but as the women did not have the handling of the money it could not be counted in with the receipts for the year. A fine spirit of co-operation prevails among the women here and excellent work is accomplished. The elections of officers for the opening year followed.

President, Mrs. Wm. Ives; Vice-Pres., Mrs. M. F. McDonald; Secretary, Mrs. Lester Mellish; Directors, Mrs. McIntyre, Mrs. Gillis, Mrs. Fraser; Auditors, Mrs. Fraser, Mrs. Gordon Ives; Delegates, Mrs. Wm. Ives and Mrs. Lester Mellish. The meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

Malpeque Women's Institute met in the Institute room on February 26th. There were twenty women present. \$50 was spent towards the defraying of expenses in connection with the ball. An acknowledgement was made of \$24.30 in aid of the hall Committee. After the usual business of the meeting lunch was served and a social hour was spent by the members.

Granville Institute held its regular meeting at the home of Mrs. J. A. McDonald on February 28th. A lunch cupboard has been placed in the school and the Hot School Lunch is proving very satisfactory. At the conclusion of the meeting lunch was served and a social time was spent.
