Tenders Called For Housing Development

Tenders are being called today, returnable August 8 for the construction by Housing Enterprises of Canada Ltd. of 32 apartment buildings in Charlottetown.

The property chosen is part of an estate on the northern portion of the City. The buildings to be constructed are of 2-story frame construction, and will be of 12 units, 12 will be of 1 design and 8 of 3 bedroom. The development has been planned around an open common area. There will be garage accommodations for 40 percent of the tenants.

As the apartments are not expected to be completed until late in the year, it is requested that no one make application for the buildings at present time. An announcement will be released in the press telling where and when to make applications from four to six weeks before the tenders are ready for occupancy.

Rentals is stated, will be moderate. A preference will be given to discharged servicemen and their families. No applicant other than a serviceman will be allowed occupancy whose income exceeds five times the rental.

Housing Enterprises of Canada Ltd. is a company jointly formed by the insurance companies doing business in Canada. Its function being to build rental housing units in those urban centres where the need is most acute. The company has further undertaken to manage its projects for a period of 50 years during which the total capital cost will be amortized. It is only by such long term amortization that the cost of the buildings, and all buildings must, therefore be of permanent and durable construction.

While the insurance companies are allowed to earn up to 5 percent on the capital, they are to look upon Housing Enterprises as a public service rather than an investment for profit.
