Several needed medical attention because of defects of vision or abnormal tonsils. 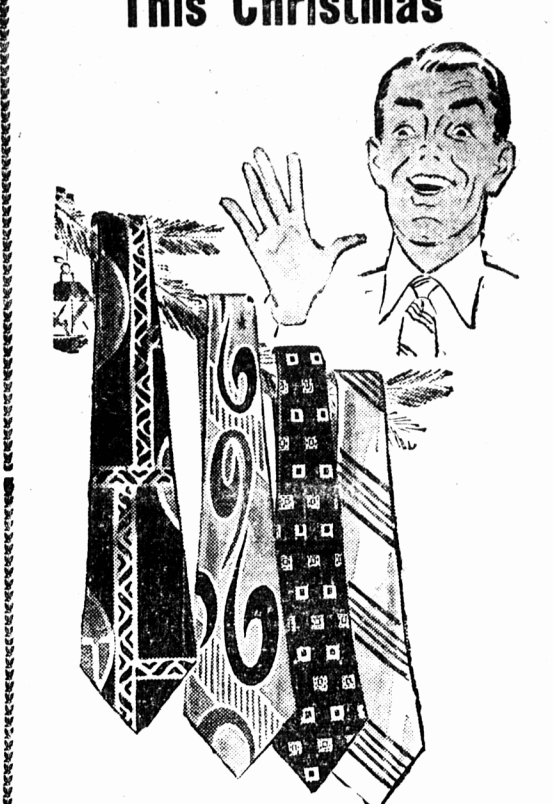
