THE COOK'S CORNER

CHOCOLATE COATED GINGER OR ORANGE PEEL

Coating chocolate is hard to buy for the confectioners are hanging on to their supplies because they fear the next order may not be filled. However I bought sweet and semi-sweet chocolate bars from the drug store and found then the best substitutes for dipping chocolate.

Melt 1-4 pound chocolate (to coat 1-2 pound fruit or nuts) in top of double boiler but it is important that you do not let the water under it reach a heavy simmer. Temperature than 125 degrees F. It will take about 15 minutes to melt. Cut the preserved ginger in desired shapes or prepare the orange peel (see directions below) and drop into cooled melted chocolate, coat it by turning it over with fingers and placing it to dry on heavy waxed paper. The dipping is ideal. To quickly reduce the temperature after chocolate is melted replace the hot water in bottom of double boiler with cold water—but do not let cold water touch bottom of top of double boiler or it will harden the chocolate too soon. A "base" will not form on the dipped pieces and chocolate is cool enough for dipping. Never dip on rainy days. Never let any water get in your dipping vessel. Cool dipped pieces and put away between layers of waxed paper as soon as cool.

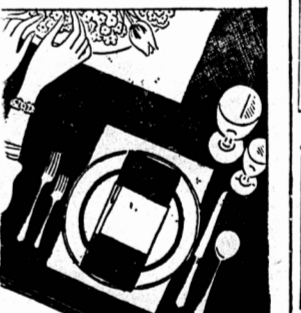
To prepare orange peel for dipping: Remove the peel from 4 oranges in lengthwise sections, cover with cold water, bring to boiling point and cook slowly until soft. Drain, remove while part with spoon, add oil peel in thin strips with scissors. Put 1 cup sugar, 1-2 cup water and peel in saucepan. Cook peel slowly until clear or 230 degrees F. Cool. If you do not want to chocolate dip the peel it may be rolled in granulated sugar.

The questions are those which have been asked by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board from housewives in this region. The answers are provided by the Board Readers who have intelligent questions to ask on price control are invited to send them in writing to the Women's Regional Advisory Committee of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

Q. Will you tell me what ration coupons expire at the end of June?

A. The coupons expiring on June 30 are butter coupons 12, 13, 14 and 15 and meat coupons 1, 2, and 3 (pairs). These coupons will be withdrawn for the purchase of the rationed goods in question after that date.

Q. To settle an argument, is it permissible for a lunch-counter to serve "hot dogs" on a meatless Tuesday?

A. No, since "hot dogs" contain meat, they cannot be sold in any public eating place between midnight on Monday and midnight on Tuesday.
