The boy's father is absent in Sydney on his vessel, the "A. Higgins," and has been notified of the sad affair by telegram. The following are the city market prices:—Pork per lb, eight and three quarters to nine and one quarter cents; potatoes per bus, twenty-five to twenty-eight cents; black oats per bus, forty-two cents and white forty cents; hay pressed per ton, one fifty to nine seventy-five and loose per cwt fifty to fifty-five; straw pressed per ton, five fifty to six and loose per cwt thirty cents; butter per lb twenty-four to twenty-six cents and eggs per doz twenty-eight to thirty.

A number of the exhibitors from this province who have been attending the Winter Fair at Amherst returned last evening by the Northumberland bringing with them as much of their stock or exhibits as they had remaining after the disposal of some of the prize winners. The success of the Provincial exhibitors was most remarkable and the enterprising farmers are to be congratulated. Among these special mention can be made of Roger Brothers, Royalty, whose splendid Guernsey cattle carried off almost everything in sight in the way of prizes. Peter Brodie, as already announced, won the cup awarded to a certain class in porkers, and the horse exhibited from this province were successful in winning the majority of prizes offered.

A correspondent writes:—Hampshire Post Office is one mile from Colville station. It is the centre of a thriving and prosperous farming section. Express trains with mail clerks on board pass Colville station twice a day. And yet if a letter is mailed at Hampshire Post Office on Thursday at noon by Monday Morning at 9 o'clock it will have travelled just three miles to North Wiltshire while if the letter writer instead of going to the Post Office on Thursday takes his letter to the train on Friday morning it will be in Boston or Montreal Saturday morning or away out in the vicinity of Winnipeg or St Louis before the present Post Office method gets it away from North Wiltshire. The situation seems crude; is hardly believed, but it is a solemn fact, three miles from its starting point.

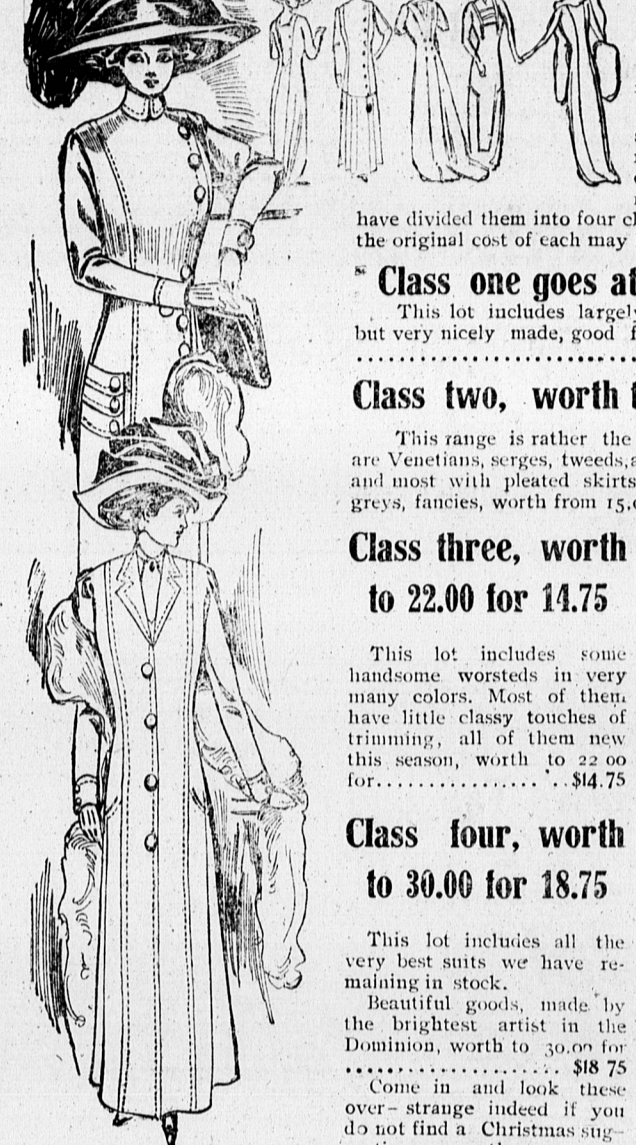
