SCHOOL FOR LIFE INSURANCE MEN—The last few years have seen many changes in the realm of life insurance, and the many innovations and improvements in the policies and service of the various companies have been of great benefit to the army of policyholders and beneficiaries in Canada. The companies are now endeavoring to raise the standard of their representatives so that only men who are thoroughly conversant with the policies they sell, and with the laws surrounding the same, will be able to secure the necessary license to sell Life Insurance. What might be called a "short-course" in life insurance will be held in Charlottetown, at the Board of Trade Rooms, on January 6th, 7th and 8th, under the auspices of the Life Underwriters Assoc. of Canada, and which will present a series of lectures by well-known authorities headed by Dr. C. J. Rockwell, formerly of the Carnegie Institute of Technology, and who has been conducting these schools in all the principal cities of Canada for some years. As this is the first time Dr. Rockwell has visited the Island it is expected that all representatives of life insurance companies in the Province will avail themselves of the opportunity to hear this noted lecturer.

Mrs. Madam Glady's Bell Owen, famous soprano soloist in "The Miracle" during its two year run in New York, was interviewed by the Regina press last week on the possibilities of operatic music for Western Canada. It was her opinion that the prairies have much to offer the world of music. Madame Owen is particularly impressed with the possibilities which this country has to offer the musical world in an opera embodying the spirit of the prairies. In such an opera, there would have to be symphony expressing the vast expanse of "opening" wheat, melancholy minor passages representative of those of its people who have come here from Russia, Scandinavia and other European countries, with rollicking bits for the British, and so forth. Just as other countries have their own particular motif of music, so should Saskatchewan. So far Quebec is the only province in the Dominion which has its folk music. Madame Owen believes the time will come when the prairies will develop theirs. Madame Owen is a singer with a wealth of experience behind her and when she talks on the subject of music she does so with an authority possessed by very few on this continent. Madame Owen was before her marriage, a few years ago, Miss Glady's Bell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Bell and was a leader in the Presbyterian Church Choir at Summerside. Recently, she was heard by Island radio fans, including her parents, in a recital given at Toronto. Mrs. Owen, whose husband has recently been appointed assistant editor of the Regina "Saskatchewan Post," has fitted up a studio, where she intends to give vocal training to selected pupils and will also continue her musical career, including her broadcasting engagements for C. K. C. K. and other stations. One of her first engagements for the C. K. C. K. was the rendering in French, German and Italian of arias from opera, light opera and folks songs.—S.

Certified Spaulding Rose for fall shipment have ranged from \$1.50 to \$2 per sack. Most of the cobblers are going to Va., while Fla. is taking the Spaulding Rose.

FIREMAN FATALLY INJURED

CAMPBELLTON, Dec. 19.—Believed fatally scalded, with his lungs seriously injured by escaping gas and steam, Robert McAllister, fireman and relieving engineer on the C. N. R. staff at Dalhousie, lies in the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital here as a result of a head-on collision between a shunting engine on the main line at Dalhousie Junction and a northbound freight train at 10:55 o'clock this morning. David McWhirter, fireman on the shunter, escaped injury by jumping from the locomotive when he sighted the freight rounding the eastern curve below the station.

FISHING BY TELEPHONE

Telephones are increasing the efficiency of the tunny fishing along the Mediterranean coast, and as a result the fish are being canned and sent to all parts of the world. A few years ago only the oil of the carcass was used for export. By the new method towers on long arms resembling ladders falling into the sea, have been erected over the water. They are wired into a man, equipped with a telephone, watches for schools of tunny, and messages to the nearest fishing village, usually a few miles up the coast. There an alarm bell summons the fishermen who go after the fish. Plans are being made for an underground railway at Kobe, Japan.

Seed Potato Movement

The following account of seed potato movement is reprinted from the New England Homestead, of Dec. 8th, published at Springfield, Mass. Seed potatoes for the 1929 crop are now moving to the southern potato sections of the U. S. A. A great deal of this seed stock is coming from Me. and Canada. Owing to the low prices of table stock, the seed market has been rather unsettled this season and prices average low. Figures released by the Me. division of plant industry show that this state had a total of 16,846 acres eligible for certification. A little over 7,000 of this acreage is Cobblers while nearly an equal amount is Gr. Mts. Over 2,000 acres consist of Spaulding Rose and the remainder is made up of varieties such as Bliss Triumph, Gold Coin, etc. Digging reports show that very little rot was found among these plantings and what was discovered ranged from 1 per cent to 2 per cent, with many fields showing none at all. State inspectors will be busy all winter getting these seed shipments ready to go to market. Very close grading is being followed so that nothing but the highest quality seed will go out from Me this season. During Oct. and to the middle of Nov. over 200 carloads of Me. seed potatoes were shipped. Most of this stock went to eastern shore Va. but several cars were sent to Fla., N. J. and N. Y.
