RAILWAY SUBSIDIES.

The pace which our rulers have set for themselves in spending the people's money received a new illustration, a few days ago when the railway subsidies bill was brought down providing at the rate of \$3,200 a mile for over four thousand miles of new railways! And this after it had been given out at the close of last session that the subsidizing of railways had ceased. Thus instead of the Grand Trunk Pacific satisfying the needs of the railway promoters and contractors, it has in fact given them further leverage by which these subsidies have been exacted. One supply has but made another want.

Now let us see how the new lines are distributed. Over 1,000 miles go to the Province of Quebec, notwithstanding that the Grand Trunk Pacific is to traverse that Province from end to end. Ontario, now covered with railways and with a large section of the Grand Trunk Pacific within its boundaries, is to get about half as much of the new subsidies as Quebec. The far west is to have another thousand miles in round figures, Nova Scotia some eight hundred and New Brunswick about two hundred miles. And what is Prince Edward Island's share? Not a single mile! Four thousand miles of railway subsidised in addition to the three thousand five hundred of the Grand Trunk—7,500 miles of railway to be built, wholly or partly at the cost of the people of Canada, and not a mile of it in Prince Edward Island.

What have the Patriot and the Pioneer to say to this distribution? What have Messrs McKinnon and Hughes to say to it? With no railway subsidies; with another winter steamer first promised and then refused; with our disgraceful telegraph service left as it was in the beginning, while all these millions are flung into the West, what are our people to think? Our representatives supporting

THE TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

A few days ago, when the House was in committee of supply Mr. Hackett, M. P. for West Prince "renewed his protest, made many times previously, when he was scarcely in order, against the bad telegraph service to Prince Edward Island under the present monopoly. Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick replied that it was too late in the session to go into the matter thoroughly, but he promised to examine it during the recess." The above is from the Toronto Globe's report.

And this is the net result of Mr. McKinnon's promise made months ago and much vaunted in The Patriot at the time, that the remedy would be applied very shortly! Such a clumsy attempt to deceive the people of Prince Edward Island must in the end react against the parties to the deception. Mr. Fitzpatrick promises to examine it during the recess. That is all. Nothing has been done and nothing is doing. We thank Mr. Hackett for breaking all the rules of order in an honest effort to right this great wrong. Had he broken a club over the heads of some ministers and members that we wot of his remonstrance would not have been stronger than the case demands.
