This winter he had intended to remove to Charlottetown to take charge of the company's can shop here. He married Miss Dobson of Cape Tormentine, who, with her ten year old son, is left to mourn the loss of a kind husband and father. In this City there survive him sorrowing parents, one brother, R. Six months ago they were called upon to mourn the death of Mrs. Warren of Moncton, a sister of the deceased.
