BRINGING UP FATHER

B. A. COSTS FIVE TIMES AS MUCH AS BACK IN '45

MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 5.—Obtaining B. A. degrees costs students of today approximately five times as much as it did shortly after the middle of the 19th century, judging from estimates of cost given in McGill University calendars for the last 75 years.

The calendar for the session 1845-55, two years after the University obtained its amended charter, pointed out that students "could obtain board and lodging in the town for from \$8 to \$16 a month." The lower figure was raised \$4 in the calendar of 1857-58 which stated that "board can be obtained in the city for \$12 to \$16 per month."

The fees in Arts were 5 pounds, approximately \$25, for the session of eight months. Board and lodging at \$14 a month would bring the total to \$137 for the session. Books were more often borrowed than bought while fees for athletics and organized activities were nil, as those had not yet come into being.

The estimate in the 1930-31 calendar for cost (moderate) of education in the faculty of arts is as follows: Tuition fees, \$125; fee for athletics, Union, etc., \$17; board and lodging \$550; books, apparatus and laboratory fees \$38; total \$730. This figure is more than five times as much as that of 75 years ago.

However, the student of today still has the advantage, according to university officials. The university undergraduate 75 years ago was considered lucky if he could earn 50 cents a day during his summer holidays. McGill engineering students get \$5 a day plus board on surveying parties during summer months. Other graduates get varying amounts usually 10 times that of the undergraduates of the '50s. If the latter were fortunate enough to get work at all.

ECONOMIC ISSUES MAY PROVOKE WAR

MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 5.—The next war, if there is one, will be fought over markets in which to dispose of raw materials, and not over raw materials themselves, or over national political aspirations, Vernon Bartlett, English journalist and member of the League of Nations, Permanent Secretariat, declared before the People's Forum in an address on "The Influence of Economics on International Politics."

His work since the formation of the League, Mr. Bartlett said, had brought him into touch with international politics and had brought him to realize just how much economics affects peace and war. Struggles of the past had not been without their economic side. It was true that Elizabethan adventurers were not indifferent to the call of patriotism and a love of fighting but neither were they indifferent to the lure of America's gold or of the gold which lay in Spanish galleons.
